Nixola-Greeley-Smith Pays Visit to Mother of Harry Thaw, Most Devoted Mother in World

"My son's splendid courage and patience are a great stimulus to me and together we are just hiding the time—and it will come—when we may once more know the meaning of a home together."

That is all Mrs. Mary C. Thaw would say when I asked her what her son's plans will be if he is admitted to jail in New Hampshire. "We have no plans," Mrs. Thaw added. "It has been a long time since either of us made PLANS. All I know now is that I am leaving Concord to return to my home in Pittsburg. Of course, I hope that Harry, if he is released on bail, will return also to Pennsylvania, but I know nothing about it. I came up here two days before New Year's to be with my son."

It was 9 o'clock in the morning and I sat and talked with Mrs. Thaw, the most devoted mother I have ever known, in one of the two rooms she has occupied in the Eagle hotel at Concord, N. H., where Harry has lived ever since his deportation from Canada after his spectacular escape from Matteawan.

The mother of Harry Thaw is tall and stately. She has absolute poise of manner, an easy, social grace which, strangely enough, is now even more marked in Harry K. Thaw, whom I met later on.

Mrs. Thaw's hair is snow-white and her blue eyes have a serenity which seems almost miraculous

when you recall her years of sorrow and dedication.

I saw Mrs. Thaw for the first time during the trial of her son for the killing of Stanford White, and, though seven years have passed since then, she does not appear perceptibly older. Now more than 70, her cheeks have a fresh pink color and her hands are plump and white.

When we met at Concord she wore a dress of black wool trimmed with bands of wide hand-embroidery done in heavy black

silk floss. The skirt was undraped, the waist had a narrow but deep square gümpe of baby Irish lace in a heavy shamrock pattern. From a chain around her neck hung a tiny gunmetal watch with Mrs. Thaw's initials set in a Gothic design of tiny diamonds. On her left hand was a wedding ring and one large solitaire, perhaps her engagement ring.

"You must have been glad that Jerome declined to come to Concord and appear before

the commission," I remarked. "Of course, he didn't come when he was asked by the commission to produce FACTS against Harry's admission to jail," Mrs. Thaw replied. "He hasn't any facts. The commission said they didn't want his OPINIONS! When it's merely a matter of opinion, Jerome can make white appear black and blue seem green!"

"My son has been greatly benefited by his stay in New Hampshire," Mrs. Thaw added. "He has gotten plenty of fresh air and exercise. The long walks he has taken with Sheriff Drew have been splendid for him."

"And, of course, merely being away from a house of horror like Matteawan after you have been there must seem like Paradise," I suggested.

"Yes, indeed, to both Harry and me," his mother answered. "I had once dined with Mrs. Thaw in the house near Matteawan asylum which she took to be near her son, so I knew how much she had shared his torture."

"I hope I shall never see that place again! I took my house there from month to month furnished so I would not establish any ties of any kind with that dreadful place. Yet I cannot help feeling that Harry's stay there was a benefit to others through what he was able to do in bringing about investigation and reform of the treatment of the poor unfortunates with whom he was confined."

EX-SOLDIER WALKS 10,000 MILES TO TEST ARMY SHOES

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—Sergeant John Walsh, U. S. A. (retired), recently walked into this city completing a 10,000-mile hike from Washington D. C., to test Uncle Sam's new army shoes.

Sergt. Walsh, who is 64 years old, was retired from the Second cavalry two years ago to become official shoe tester for the army.

When the war department lets a contract for shoeing the army, which involves an enormous quantity of footwear, numerous tests are made of types of shoe that the most durable and comfortable may be chosen.

To Sergt. Walsh is delegated the choice, and he makes his recommendations on actual wear and tear of shoes. On this recent trip, which began May 6, he has worn out six pairs of shoes. He put on his seventh pair at Rugby, S. D., and they were polished for the first time on his arrival in Oakland, Cal.

As soon as the veteran walker had made out his official reports on footwear, to be sent to Washington, he started immediately on another tramp across the continent.

The neighbors also have started in to raise \$57 taxes against the place to give the widow of the old soldier here home free of incumbrance. Mrs. J. E. Darnell appeared before the council in behalf of the cause this morning.

POLITICAL GOSSIP

The Bull Moose party is beginning to get ready for the coming campaign.

Tuesday a luncheon will be given at the Y. W. C. A., when W. H. Hunter will speak. Miss Marjorie Johnson will speak at a schoolhouse meeting at Milton the same evening. Seventh ward progressives will hold a meeting in Gilbert hall Wednesday night. Arrangements are being made for a big Lincoln day banquet February 12 at the Y. W. C. A. Prof. J. Allen Smith of the state university has agreed to speak at the banquet. A feature of the occasion is being worked up by Secretary Burns Poe to have all the old voters who voted for Lincoln and voted the progressive ticket last year occupy seats of honor.

James A. Drake, former U. S. marshal, later U. S. clerk and for many years the thorn in the flesh of the Stone-Webster interests here in the power fight, is said to be intending to take another chance at the light and water commissioners'hip this spring.

Drake was the manager for the old Snoqualmie power company before it was gobbled by Stone-Webster, and he is known to have kept things interesting for the Boston syndicate. He came within a few votes of getting the nomination against Lawson in the recall election, and his friends are already out working for him for the place.

A woman for city commissioner—why not?

Some Tacoma women are asking that question in all seriousness. They insist that there are a lot of women who could at least do as well as some who have drawn the \$300 per month of the municipality. Stranger things have happened than that some wide-awake women may be launched into the campaign this spring. Some active women are at least talking about it.

Rumors of a recall for one and possibly both of the helldog city commissioners are getting louder than ever. City Clerk Edwards was informed today by a citizen who declared he knew that there would be a recall. A prominent reform worker in the city said this morning that "there will be the most complete housecleaning at the city hall this spring there has ever been."

A secret organized movement is on looking to a recall, but as yet no active steps have been taken to launch it.

Seventh ward prohibitionists will join with the church organizations in their "Washington Dry" campaign to open Tuesday night in the vacant store room

between Pine and Anderson on Sixth avenue. The meetings will last four nights, and every house in the district will be canvassed this week.

Registration at the end of work Saturday night stood at 9,014 for the 12 days. This breaks all records. Saturday alone 978 were added. There are now 6,659 men and 2,355 women. Curbstone politicians differ as to the cause of the registration activity. "It's A. V. Fawcett," says one. "It is the coming prohibition campaign," says another. Others declare it is just a deep-seated determination of the citizens to get better government in the city hall. It probably is a combination of all these and others. Anyway, it looks as if Tacoma is going to show the greatest registration in her history this year.

It looks as if the city hall will furnish a pretty good list of candidates for the commissioners'hip this spring. Ed White, A. F. Metzger, Dudley Eschman and Norton Taylor are already in the arena from the ranks of the subordinates, with Lawson and Freeland pretty apt to be in the contest, besides A. L. Thorn and Hamilton Gronen, who are practically city hall employes, although both are out just now.

\$330 Paid for Lock of Abe Lincoln's Hair

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—The final session in the sale of the late Major William H. Lambert's library, comprising the more important of his Lincolniana, was held today. The total was \$5,280. The grand total thus far is \$52,439.

C. Hines obtained for \$330 a lock of hair, cut from Lincoln's hair after he was shot. It is in a gold case.

Harry Pagan paid the highest price of the day, \$6000, for a presentation copy from Lincoln to W. M. Coggill of "Political Debates Between Abraham Lincoln and Hon. Stephen A. Douglas."

POLICE FIND MAN WHO RAN DOWN LITTLE GIRL

Following an investigation begun yesterday, the police today learned that Richard Burglund, employed at the North End Fuel company, North 27th and Proctor street, was the motorcyclist who Sunday ran down and seriously injured Ello Phagni, age 12, according to an announcement by Capt. of Detectives Fitzgerald John Ericklund, 1927 South E street, was riding on the rear seat with Burglund. Evidence of the accident has been turned over by the police to the prosecuting attorney's office.

Little Ello Phagni was playing with some companions at 17th and E streets when the motorcycle struck him. According to witnesses, the driver did not stop or look back to see whether the child was seriously hurt. The injured boy was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, where it was found that his injuries were serious but probably not fatal. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Vitori Phagni, 416 South 17th street.
