

STILES WILL SHOW CITY'S POSITION

Judge Stiles will prepare an official report to show the improvement clubs opposed to the present system of laying water mains that the city cannot pay back to them the money paid for this purpose in the past.

Controller Johnny Meads boosted himself into office by waging a campaign for this two years ago and the people voted to stop assessing for water mains and to pay back what had been paid, but the law prohibited the repayment, and there was no money to lay mains any other way, as Meads knew at the time, so nothing came of it. The people who were led into that fight, however, never understood why they did not get action, so they appeared again with resolutions from the improvement club, and the council Monday morning voted that Judge Stiles should get up a report showing the futility of such a movement in the present conditions in Tacoma.

STILES BLOCKS THE BOARD'S PROGRAM

The city civil service board appeared before the council Monday morning and Judge Burdick explained the changes it is contemplating in the new civil service section of the charter.

The main change is that when employees are discharged they may appeal to the board and have a public hearing before the board if not satisfied with the hearing before the commissioner.

Judge Stiles objected to many features of the program. He said he had hoped the board would get up a comprehensive civil service that would be complete and have virility but that the present effort is simply extending the scope of the old civil service which was inadequate and unsatisfactory.

The council finally referred the matter back to the civil service board which will meet with Judge Stiles and try to get something that will cover the whole case.
