**THREATENS CONDUCTOR WITH GUN**

Following a heated argument on the platform of outbound Point Defiance car No. 103 on lower G street at 9 o'clock last night, in which H. M. Shovlain, 2705 North Union avenue, is said to have drawn a revolver on Conductor Jay Smythe, Shovlain was arrested and lodged at the city jail all night on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. The furniture dealer was released today on his own recognizance, but later re-arrested by Constable Fred Shaw on a warrant charging him with having threatened to kill the conductor.

Shovlain is said to have drawn a powerful automatic revolver from his pocket, aimed it at the conductor, and released the "safety" preparatory to shooting. Smythe grappled with him and overpowered him, holding him prisoner until Officers Thompson and Goodman, hurrying to the scene in a taxicab, took charge of the prisoner. The officers confiscated Shovlain's weapon. They found the "safety" released and the deadly firearm ready to discharge a stream of eight bullets the moment that the trigger was touched.

**PROBES PLOT TO CHEAT INDIANS**

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 14.—Uncle Sam is looking into a movement by alleged heirs of Moses Abromet in Yuma county, Arizona, who are attempting to sell 200,000 acres of land worth \$2,000,000 which the government claims. Abromet was the son of a Frenchman who joined the Indians and became chief, his son following him as head of the tribe and acquiring Indian deeds for vast areas of land.

**WANTS ASIATIC EXCLUSION**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Immigration Commissioner Caminetti stirred up the immigration committee by making a determined plea for Asiatic exclusion, declaring the Asiatic is a menace to the whole country and thousands are slipping in.

He declared Japanese are coming in surreptitiously and have doubled in the country in the last five or six years.

**EXPRESS RATES ARE NOW LOWER**

The interstate commerce commission has accented the amended rates for express companies in the fifth zone as recommended by the Oregon and Washington public service commissions. This will reduce rates in this zone on 100 pounds from 70 cents to as low as 55 cents in some instances.

**NO MORE ROADS FOR THIS YEAR**

No more road work can be done from the 1914 county funds, the annual appropriation having been exhausted, according to the statement made by the county commissioners yesterday afternoon to a delegation of Alderton residents, who asked for a two-mile hard surface road.
