PIONEERS FETE GEN. STEVENS

General Hazard Stevens, son of Governor Isaac I. Stevens, first governor of the territory of Washington, was heartily entertained yesterday afternoon at the State Historical building by 100 or more pioneers of Puget Sound, many of whom had known Governor Stevens while he was governor. Among the speakers were F. W. Brown, who told in complimentary vein of Governor Stevens' efforts to protect the early settlers from the Indians, who were then on the warpath. Rev. Edwin Eels, the oldest native born son of Washington, made an address, followed by John H. Williams, the Mt. Tacoma historian.

TRAIN WRECK VICTIM BETTER

J. H. Holden, who was injured in Stampede tunnel Wednesday when the air hose of a cattle train broke, causing a helper locomotive to ram the caboose, is reported as recovering. The remains of William Mackschnsker, a cattlemen who was killed, are at Ellensburg.

COUSIN OF GOVERNOR JOHNSON WANTED

Having come to Tacoma with a hard-luck story, and touched the feelings of Miss Della Votaw, daughter of ex-Postmaster Votaw, to the extent that she endorsed his draft for \$100, S. A. Adams, a second cousin of Governor Hiram Johnson of California, is being sought by the Tacoma authorities. The draft was cashed by the Scandinavian-American bank, but when it was sent east it was returned with the report that it was bogus. Adams is a member of a prominent eastern family. He went from Tacoma to California, obtained a large sum of money from Governor Johnson on the same hard-luck story, and has since disappeared.

Only one applicant was on hand yesterday afternoon to take the federal examination before Civil Service Examiner Michael Dowd for the position of manual training teacher at the Cushman school. The position pays \$1,200 a year.

The bishop says this proves that the use of the word "obey" in the English service is unwarranted.

JURY TRAILS FOR STRIKERS

The first of the criminal cases resulting from Euston's smelter strike to reach the superior court was filed in court yesterday afternoon. It is the appeal on the conviction of D. P. Slaughter and Steve Sutich, charged with having participated in an unlawful assembly. The men were convicted in police court and fined \$5 and costs. "We will appeal every case in which a conviction is returned," said Attorney Homer Bone today, "and we will demand jury trials in each case."

MARRIED MEN WANT WORK

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 27.—A petition several yards long, asking Governor West to provide work for the unemployed, has been received from J. A. Chapman, secretary of the Married Men's State Industrial league in Portland. West said he would refer the matter to the emergency board and favored an appropriation of a reasonable sum to provide work for the needy.

Blomquist delivered the address of welcome to the visitors. The conference opened at 8:45 today and will continue all day. This evening Rev. N. J. W. Nelson of Bellingham will talk on Missions.

BONES IN COURT

Bones of the lower limbs and feet of human beings were introduced as exhibits yesterday afternoon in the case of Pete Dahl, a logger, against Dr. G. C. Wagner. Dahl's foot was crushed recently and he asserts that Dr. Wagner, called to attend him, ignored the case and turned it over to a nurse. Dahl wants \$10,000 damages.

SUICIDES

MARCHFIELD, Feb. 27.—Because he was without money and sick, F. H. Martin, aged 46, committed suicide Thursday in a room in the Hotel North Bend. His mother, Mrs. J. H. McBride of Portland, was notified. Martin was formerly a pugilist.

SEARCHING FOR BANDIT LOPEZ

ST. PAUL, Feb. 27.—Much interest was added here today by the reappearance of Ralph Lopez, the Mexican desperado who took refuge in the mine at Bingham, Utah, after slaying six men and escaped. Lopez was seen at a horse sale yesterday, according to Moses Zimmerman, a horse dealer who knew the bandit in Colorado. "I met Lopez several times at the horse sale in Denver in July," said Zimmerman today and I am positive it was he who appeared at yesterday's sale." Several of Zimmerman's friends corroborated his story. Asked by the police why he made no effort to capture the bandit, Zimmerman replied: "Lopez shoots from the hip." The police department has been given instructions to watch every avenue of escape and a dragnet has been established. The chief of police is hopeful of an early capture of the bandit.

PROFESSOR CALLS EUGENICS A JOKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 27.—"Eugenics today has become a joke and the American press and public show their native good sense by taking it as a joke.
