PACIFIC FLEET READY TO LEAVE

to sail within twenty-four hours' notice. Stores and eight-inch ammunition will be loaded at Mare Island. Every available man of the marine corps stationed at the barracks in the yard has been called out with full equipment for field service. The few men remaining consist of a small sentry guard and men who have less than three months to serve. The marines will embark on the Pittsburg tomorrow, taking field guns and tents, uniform for tropical service and emergency rations. SAN FRANCISCO, April 16.—Local army and navy circles are in a state of expectancy at what developments may be in the situation on the west coast of Mexico. At present there are in lower coast waters three cruisers, headed by the flagship California, and three gunboats, which have been maintaining headquarters at Mazatlan and Guaymas, the two principal ports on the west coast of the southern republic. This is considered a sufficient fleet to handle conditions unless serious developments ensue, in which case the fleet could be augmented by the cruiser Maryland and the naval transport Buffalo, now at Mare Island, but under orders to proceed to Alaskan waters.

BREMERTON, April 16.—Unusual activity prevailed in all departments of the navy yard today. The armored cruiser Pittsburg, which arrived Sunday to go into ordinary reserve, was placed again in full commission. Orders detaching officers and men of that vessel were revoked, her ammunition was replaced aboard and all the work the navy yard had started was called off. Instead of having needed repairs to boilers made and a new battery installed, the Pittsburg will coal at once and make ready.

BOLD GANG OF ROBBERS IS CAPTURED

SEATTLE, April 16.—Said to be members of an international gang of robbers, and identified as the men who held up the Elma state bank March 28, five Russians were captured in a cheap lodging house last night and are on their way to Montesano, under guard, today for trial. Bank accounts totaling \$1,150 were held by the gang, and the money was deposited two days after the Elma robbery. Detectives say that the gang leader took \$1,700 of the loot and is now on his way across the Atlantic ocean. English police officers have been asked to arrest him.

GETS RED PEPPER IN HIS EYES

Engaging in a saloon brawl at midnight last night, James Carey, said by the police to be a vagrant, was blinded by a shower of red pepper thrown into his eyes. Officer John Strickland took Carey to the county hospital, where the pepper was removed, and later took the man to the city jail.

SALEM, Ore., April 16.—The Northern Pacific Terminal company, controlling the union depot at Portland, is summarily ordered to cease giving the Baggage & Omnibus Transfer company a monopoly of the depot baggage business, in an order of the state railroad commission. J. D. Banker, 6019 South Warner street, manager of the Banker Lumber company of South Tacoma, disappeared from his home a week ago, and has caused anguish to his wife and uneasiness to his friends by his mysterious seclusion. He was seen on Thursday morning, when he visited his lumber yard for a few moments, and yesterday sent a letter to his wife, mailed on a train and without a postmark. Banker's business affairs are in good shape and he has had no domestic trouble, according to his wife. He is the father of two girls, four and three years of age. He is well known in lumbering circles and has conducted the South Tacoma business for several years. Although his family and friends are mystified and anxious over his disappearance, no report has been made to the police department, according to Captain J. E.
