NEW TARIFF ON PASSENGER RATES WITHIN TEN DAYS

The state railroad commission's order in 1910 reducing rates on the Puget Sound Electric company's interurban cars between Tacoma, Seattle and way points, caused a reduction of the company's net earnings from the 7 per cent fixed by the commission as a fair profit, to 1.66 per cent, according to a statement by Manager Louis H. Bean. As a result, the public service commission, successor to the state railroad commission, has allowed rates to be slightly increased, and the company announces that increases will only be made in such a manner as to guarantee a fair net profit.
There will probably be no change on through rates between Tacoma and Seattle, but a slight raise will be made on round trip rates between the terminals and intermediate points. A new tariff of rates will be published and put into effect within the next ten days.


