VILLA EXECUTES 33 PRISONERS

JUAREZ, Mex., May 21.—General Orzono and several other officers were executed by Gen. Villa after the battle of Paredon, according to his message to Gen. Carranza. Regarding the executions, Villa reported: "There were captured also a general and 32 officers. All were executed immediately."

N. W. RAILROADS ARE INDICTED

NORTH YAKIMA, May 21.—Five indictments against railroads in Washington, Idaho and Montana, and against the Potlatch Lumber company of Palouse, Wash., were returned by the federal grand jury, charging illegal rebates.

12,000 Crates Off
A cargo of 12,000 strawberry crates started from Tacoma yesterday on barges for Winslow, on Bainbridge island, where a record berry crop is being picked, and 40,000 more crates will be shipped shortly.

Carried Big Load
The N. Y. K. liner Awa Maru, which left Tacoma this week for the Orient, carried a varied cargo of mechanical devices, including 2.8 cases of electrical machinery, valued at \$10,995.

Back On The Run
The steamer Olympia, formerly the Telegraph, will be placed on a triangular run between Olympia, Tacoma and Seattle tomorrow morning. She will use the Municipal dock, calling there at 10 a. m. from Olympia and at 6 p. m. on her trip back from Seattle from the Municipal dock.

Loses Nose in Scrap
Engaging in a fight with Antonio Horaschach at Buckley, Dan Bulik came out with part of his nose missing and other painful injuries. In a charge filed against Horaschach, it is alleged that he deliberately bit off the end of Bulik's nose. The latter was taken to the St. Joseph's hospital, where flesh from both cheeks was grafted on the bitten nose.

KEPT MONEY IN BED
BAKER CITY, May 21.—Declaring the money had been stolen from her hiding place in her bed, Mollie Irwin, indicted yesterday, denied she embezzled \$1,562 from the mone yorder department.

NO DATE FIXED.
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—Senators Williams, Kenyon and Hollis, in speeches made yesterday, upheld Wilson's tolls program. No date has been fixed for the final vote.

Masonic funeral services were held yesterday for the late H. C. I. Hanson, a well known Tacoma salesman, who was for many years connected with the Morris Gross company and later with the McCormack Brothers' store.



PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 21.—Miss Elise Hepburn, great grand niece of Commodore Jo Barry, will unveil the monument to be dedicated at Washington, May 16, to the "Father of the American Navy." The Barry memorial statue, which cost \$50,000, is a tribute from the United States to the revolutionary naval hero.

SEVEN INDICTED.
PORTLAND, Ore., May 21.—Seven prominent business men of Portland were indicted on a libel charge as the result of their campaign against the interurban railway franchise applied for by George F. Heusner a year ago. The alleged libel was in connection of a cartoon they caused to be published.

John Kregler, a farmer who suffered the delusion that everyone was trying to injure him, was committed to the insane hospital at Stellacoom yesterday afternoon.


Rah for the Fish Man
