FLAMES DESTROY CITY OF LEBAM; LOSS IS \$500.00

LEBAM, Wash., May 22.—The heart of Lebam, a city of 600 to 800 inhabitants, located on the Chehalis and South Bend branch of the Northern Pacific a short distance from South Bend, is practically a pile of wreckage and debris, entirely wiped out, except for a few outlying homes and buildings, by a fire which started in the boiler room of the Lebam Mill and Lumber company paper mill yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Loss is estimated at about \$500,000.

Over 600 people are homeless today and without food, as practically all the food supply was destroyed in the flames. A partial list of buildings destroyed is: Paper mill, sawmill, shingle mill and planing mill; total loss, \$400,000.

SEATTLE, May 22.—After being out three hours, the jury last night acquitted Mrs. Magdallina Werner of the murder of her husband, Henry Werner, an Issaquah farmer. The jurors shook hands with the woman, who sobbed on her sister's arm when she learned of her freedom, after months in jail. The verdict was a surprise to the state, as a confession had been obtained from Mrs. Werner shortly after her arrest that she had hired Frank Picconi for \$100 to kill her husband. Picconi offered to testify, but both the state and the defense objected. Throughout the trial crowds surged into the courtroom, and yesterday three women were hurt and one man's pockets were picked for \$25.
