Hits Bill Where It Hurts

When U. S. judges aren't committing tragedy, they're usually committing comedy, and one of the funniest things is the recent decision of Judge Dooling, in "the billion dollar oil case" in California.

In 1909 President Taft withdrew from entry 3,041,000 acres of western oil lands, largely in California. Now, Judge Dooling decides that Taft had no right to do it.

The matter goes to the U. S. supreme court, but we're going to laugh until we hear whether Taft favors recall of Dooling or recall of Dooling's decision. To over-rule the president of the United States, especially when that president has fatty degeneration of judicial temperament, shows spunk. Is Cousin Bill going to quietly submit to being whacked in this way?

A Date To Remember

Keep the date June 1, 1914, in your mind. On that date reached the U. S. supreme court one of the most important cases on record. It is a simple case, because a new and simple point is presented, and there are not the usual ambiguous or contradictory precedents to befuddle both judges and public.

Let us see if the U. S. supreme court will give us justice by promptly rendering a decision. The nine judges of that court are well paid and irresponsible, and that court has been earning the disrespect of the people by its laziness and its delay quite as much as by the character of its decisions.

The case we refer to is this: The state of Oregon enacted a law fixing a minimum wage of \$8.64 per week for women, and a Portland box manufacturer attacks that law's constitutionality.

If the U. S. supreme court loafs on this case as usual, thousands of women in Oregon may be meanly deprived of wages which their states says are their due. That would be robbery—legal, all right, but robbery. Will the U. S. supreme court be party to robbery of working women?

Again, if the U. S. supreme court, on the other hand, decides that a state cannot eliminate female wage-slavery, the country will desire to change constitution, if not the courts, and the earlier such reform is started the better, for it will be a long, hard job.

Keep the date June 1, 1914, in mind! Observe when the U. S. supreme court gets around to deciding this great point in wage-slavery.


