

"Wet" or "Dry" Folks?

"Wet" and "Dry" Editor: An editorial in Heart's magazine of December, 1913, says the nation's crime bill last year was four and one-half times the bill of twenty years ago. Yet, all this time the country has been "going dry" by prohibitory law. If whiskey is the great contributing cause of all crime, as the prohibitionists allege, then prohibition either increases whisky consumption or prohibition whisky is far more deadly than that retailed in the open saloon, or its substitution for beer, under prohibition, has had a marked degenerating effect on the nation as a whole. Anderson, president of New York State Anti-Saloon league read the following letter before the house and senate judiciary committees in Washington last April: "To the Keely Institute, Dwight, Ill., Gentlemen: Our customers are your prospective patients.
