CAL. VOLCANO BELCHES FIRE

REDDING, Cal., July 1.—The fiercest eruption of Mount Lassen since the main crater burst into activity a month ago occurred today. The air was still. Just before 6 o'clock this morning a huge puff of smoke shot up and ascended straight into the sky. It shot a mile high before the smoke formed into a "mush-

room." Then the rain of ashes and pumice began and covered the surrounding country. The eruption was visible for an hour when dense smoke settled over the mountain and obscured the view. The continued violence of the disturbance is creating terror among the people living in the foothills and many hurried to this city this morning.

"FRAUD AND COLEUSION" DIVORCE DEFENDANT FIGHTS FOR \$50,000

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—Agnes Pecharich, fighting to claim a wife's share of \$50,000 mining property belonging to her husband, Philip Pecharich, became defendant recently in a second suit for divorce filed secretly in the local superior court by her husband, who charges her with various indiscretions.

Meanwhile Mrs. Pecharich has left for Tucson, Ariz., where her husband is now settling up his business affairs, for the purpose of bringing suit against him on the grounds of cruelty, neglect and desertion before he can get his property beyond her reach. Pecharich was granted an interlocutory decree by Judge Griffin in last December. At that time Pecharich was represented by Gerald F. Halsey and Mrs. Pecharich by Halsey L. Rixford, attorneys who have adjoining offices.

Judge Griffin set aside the divorce on Mrs. Pecharich's petition, having discovered that there had been collusion and fraud practiced on the court and that the Pechariches were living together as man and wife while the case was on trial.
