**HOP GROWERS ON RECORD AGAINST PROHIBITION BILL**

The Hop Growers' association at its meeting held here yesterday, after transacting routine business, went on record with a strong resolution against the proposed state-wide prohibition bill.

President Muehler, in his address to the hop growers, arraigned the prohibition bill as it is framed as a measure in favor of breweries without the state and discriminating against breweries within the state that employ labor here. He contended that under the proposed bill it will not be illegal to buy beer manufactured in Oregon by Oregon breweries.

Outlining the main facts regarding the hop industry of the state, Muehler said:

The hop crop of this state was sold last year for over \$1,329,000, and the outlook for this year is greater and will reach close to \$2,000,000. There are over 5,500 acres in hop fields in this state, and the average ten bales of 200 pounds to the acre.

Hop yards are worth from \$400 to \$500 per acre, and if the hop industry is destroyed the land

will not be worth then from \$150 to \$200 per acre, which means a loss of over \$1,650,000 dollars to the hop grower and a like amount of taxable property lost to the state, and other property will have to bear the increase in tax levy. This prohibition does not alone hit the hop grower, it will affect all tax payers in an increase in their taxes.

Hop picking alone gives employment to over 15,000 people during the season, and the general care of the hop fields during the entire year gives employment to over a thousand people.

**TO REACH THE STADIUM**

From any downtown point, take either Old Town or Point Defiance cars. Admission to the Stadium will be 25 cents for adults and 15 cents for children on July 2 and 3, 50 cents and 15 cents on July 4. There will be no reserved seats in the Stadium for any performance.

**HOW TO REACH SPEEDWAY FROM TACOMA**

The Speedway is situated south of Tacoma, about seven miles from Pacific avenue and 11th street, on the roads to the lakes.

A—South on Pacific avenue and Jefferson avenue to Center street, follow to end of paving, across railroad track on left, turn to right and follow main road.

B—South on Pacific avenue to south end of first bridge; take plank street at right on edge of gulch and follow street car line. Aside from a few blocks of planking, this road is paved all the way.

C—South on Pacific avenue to 38th street, turn to the right (west) to G street, follow car line to South Tacoma.

D—Trains will leave the Union station every few minutes and stop near the grandstand.

E—Tacoma Railway & Power company South Tacoma cars will connect with auto buses for grandstand and field gate on east side, or 10 minutes' walk will take you there.

F—Pacific Traction company cars to Lakewood station will land you one mile west of the track.

It cost Martin \$16 for his experience, so he is out just \$6.50. But there is no law in this state to protect a workman and the employment men are not required to pay back anything over the fee and carfare. So what are you going to do in a case like this for Martin?
