### BUILDER OF OCEAN FLYING BOAT, "AMERICA," FOR THE FIRST TIME GIVES HIS OPINION OF WHAT HIS AEROPLANE CAN DO—DECLARES IT WILL CROSS THE ATLANTIC IF ANYTHING WILL

(Glenn Curtis, builder of the trans-Atlantic hydroplane "America," has steadfastly refused to comment exhaustively on the results of his handiwork. He would not predict whether he thinks she will fly clear across the herring pond or not. In the following our special aviator-reporter, Phil Rader, who is going to watch the "America" for our readers till she disappears over the Atlantic horizon, gives an important interview with Curtis, in which he gives his opinion of the ocean-flying ship.—Editor.)

BY PHIL D. RADER, Aviator-Reporter for the Scripps Northwest Newspapers. HAMMONDSPORT, N. Y., July 22.—I have just returned from a long talk with the builder of the "America," Glenn H. Curtis, and I cannot now, at least, see how this winged vessel can fail. WHY I'M READY TO MAKE THE LEAP MYSELF, from shore to far since the creator of the hydroaeroplane, in his own words, thinks of his beautiful flyer and told me between pulls with his safety razor.

"What do you think of the 'America'?" I asked Curtis, the thin raw-boned, colorless chap of forty or thereabouts, in the last few days he has largely helped to realize man's dream to open the sky to the earth-born. "Do you believe in her as she stands there?"

"Why, yes," said Glenn Curtis, and that was sincere surprise in his voice. "Why not? Isn't she just like the rest of my flying boats and all swim and fly, don't they?"

And then Curtis grew grave. "As a strict matter of fact," he said, "the 'America' this very minute is perfect except for practically one detail, and that this is so, is really a great and exceptional achievement, we believe, because to build a double-size model of the Curtis hydroplane and have it behave exactly as well as the regular size model is a much harder problem than appears on the surface.

"First our initial test disclosed the fact that she was strong enough to carry through the air the required load of 2,000 pounds and at the speed necessary for the successful completion of her set task. And, secondly, we found that she would travel in the air with one engine dead, so long a time as ten hours, a thing a hydroplane with two engines had never done before. And this meant to us that she could actually fly the Atlantic on half fuel by alternating the use of the engines every ten hours.

"But, of course, to be on the safe side, we want the 'America' to be able to lift and to carry enough fuel to run both engines at the same time and not for twenty hours, but for twenty-four hours. As the 'America' weighs 2,800 pounds herself, the total weight she must raise and keep in motion is about 5,000 pounds.

"The one problem, a detail as it has always seemed to me, still left to solve is the one of getting the 'America' to plane in the water with the required load. She carries beautifully any weight in the air, but so far she has been able to raise from the water no more than 1,700 pounds. We are now experimenting with pontoons placed on either side of her hull to see if the greatly increased

surface of the floatation presented to the waves in this manner won't help her to mount rapidly into the air.

"I am of the opinion personally that we shall eventually have stimpily to add to the 'America' more planing surface, this to be placed low on either side of the hull, where the pontoons now are, and to add, besides, two submerged fins. Then I am certain that she will lift her ton load out of the waves like the great swimming eagle she is and the Atlantic will be crossed for the first time."

### WIFE WANTS "DEAD" HUBBY ARRESTED

ABERDEEN, July 22.—Alleging that her husband is not dead and that an attempt is being made to make her the victim of a plot for the desertion of herself and two children, Mrs. Lena Gustafson, wife of Ed Gustafson, has caused a warrant to be sworn out for his arrest and it has been sent to the police of Escanaba, Mich., for service.

Gustafson, with his brother, Alex, left May 1 to visit in Michigan. On May 15 a letter was received by Mrs. Gustafson from Axel stating that Ed Gustafson was taken ill shortly after reaching Escanaba and had died.

The wife, who is trying to support herself and two children, has had an investigation made, but can learn nothing of the truth of the reported death.

### PEN TRUSTY MAKES ESCAPE

WALLA WALLA, July 22.—T. Michera, an Austrian, brought here from Spokane in 1912 to serve three to fifteen years for grand larceny, escaped from the prison yesterday. He was a trusty and was sent at 5 o'clock to ranch a fire at the chicken pen to heat asphalt. The crew arriving at 7 o'clock found he had kept on going. Michera is the third convict in four days to prove false to his trust, two leaving from the farm Saturday afternoon.
