Lieutenant Governor Louis Hart, the little mannikin of the standpat bosses, who happens to do all the snoring when the legislature is in session at Olympia, turned a cute little trick this morning, and today Louis is chuckling chuckles, accompanied by a grand chorus of standpaters who were in on the coup.

This is how it happened. The progressives two weeks ago hired Odd Fellows' hall from Louis, who happens to be the custodian of the place. Today Louis, after pondering a bit, decided that the hall would probably be contaminated with an "unsavory" amount of progressive atmosphere, and canceled the date, leaving the Bull Moose in the hole.

The Clark county progressives will hold a conference tomorrow at Vancouver. Mayor Hubbell of Kelso will attend that meeting instead of the Pierce county conference tomorrow.

Tom Murphine, a progressive leader of Seattle, is a candidate to go back to the legislature and has announced his candidacy for the speakership.

STRIKERS AND TROOPS RIOT

ST. PETERSBURG, July 24.—Violent riots between strikers and Russian troops continued here throughout the day. Repeated attempts were made to resume street car service, but without success. Eighty cars were destroyed. Fierce charges by the Cossacks were met by determined resistance from the strikers. The hospitals were filled with wounded.

Cossacks were active everywhere, breaking up crowds and scattering anti-government demonstrators. The strikers were persistent, however, and reassembled as often as the cavalry dispersed them.

URGES APPLE STORAGE PLANT

Washington's apple crop for 1914 will be 16,000 carloads, and scarcely any of it will come through Tacoma because this city has been negligent in building a municipal cold storage plant.

This fact was brought out in a letter to Mayor Fawcett today by C. A. Tonnason, editor of the Northwestern Horticulturist and Dairyman, an expert on fruit raising.

No Damages for "Anguish" On a Telegram That Is Not Delivered

OLYMPIA, July 24.—In the case of Mrs. Corcoran of Seattle and her husband, Charles E. Corcoran, against the Postal Telegraph Cable company, the King county court's award of damages, in the sum of \$500 is set aside by the supreme court, which holds there is no special statute covering mental anguish independent of physical damages of financial loss, and that the only recovery permitted under the law in this case is the return of 75 cents, the cost of sending the message involved which was never delivered.

ABERDEEN MAN KILLED
 ABERDEEN, July 24.—W. C. Anderson of this city, was instantly killed between Hoquiam and Moclips when he fell between the coaches of a Northern Pacific passenger train.
