TO FRY FLOUNDER

Beat an egg and season with salt and pepper. Then take boneless part of flounder and dip in egg batter. Then roll in oyster cracker crumbs and fry in smoking hot cottolene or oil. Garnish and serve with sliced lemon.

Explanation how to prepare a flounder for cooking by M. W. Marush, proprietor of the Queen City Fish & Oyster Co.:

"Now that pleasure fishing is at hand, it's a great help to dress your fish at home.

"To dress flounder for frying, lay on the table and cut in the center until you reach the bone and split from the gills to the tail, then begin at the gills again, turn the knife toward you and split next to the other side until your tenderloins are removed. After this, just skin, which is easily done with a sharp knife."
