# BUTCHER SOLDIERS

BRUSSELS, Aug. 11.—Hard fighting between the Belgians and French, on one side, and the Germans on the other, was in progress today north of the river Meuse. The Belgians still held the Liege forts. The allies, France, England and Belgium, are moving reinforcements from Namur to the Liege garrisons.

The war office today published the following account of the German attack on Fort Seraing Sunday night: "For three hours the Germans vainly charged the forts' approaches. Finally the retired, beaten, leaving 800 dead on the field. Many of the dead were caught between stakes and barbed wire entanglements in front of the fort. Dead and wounded scattered over an area a half mile square.

PARIS, Aug. 11.—The entire French army in Alsace is fighting the Germans today, it is admitted here, both sides suffering reavy losses.

## British Warship Is Destroyed?

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—That wreckage found last night near the South Side lifesaving station came from the British warship Shearwater was the belief of Captain Grosbeck of the lifesaving station today. Early today four more seven-foot doors were washed ashore, and a metal plate bearing the word "Grosbeck" was attached to one of the doors. Grosbeck believes that the ship was wrecked by an explosion from within because the doors were not splintered.

## FOOD PRICES SOAR

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Prices of meat, sugar, imported foodstuffs and wearing apparel are soaring. Meats advanced today 4 and 5 cents per pound. Other advances were: Dress goods, 10 per cent; shirts, 25 per cent; tea, 25 per cent; cheese, 20 per cent.

CHICAGO, Aug. 11.—That it will appoint a committee to investigate the causes for the sudden advance in the price of meats was the announcement which Chicago butchers' association gave out today. They denounced the high meat prices. Patrons were advised today not to buy certain meat cuts. Beef cuts were from 3 to 5 cents higher than yesterday.

## FUNERAL TRAIN PASSES SOUTH

GAINESVILLE, Ga., Aug. 11.—The solid south mourned today with President Wilson and his daughters over the death of Mrs. Wilson. Church bells tolled in every city and hamlet through which the funeral train passed on its way to Rome, Georgia, where it was scheduled to arrive at 2:30 o'clock.

Funeral services will be held from the First Presbyterian church and the body will be buried in Myrtle Hill cemetery, beside Mrs. Wilson's father and mother. Crowds stood at each station bareheaded and silent. The president remained beside the casket until 1 o'clock this morning.

## GERMAN CAVALRY ACTIVE

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Two German cavalry divisions are operating about Tongres, Belgium, north of Liege, according to an official statement issued by the government press bureau. It was announced that the Germans were entrenching along the river Aisne and that large numbers were invading Belgium from Luxemburg to the south and eastward.

## GERMAN LOSSES 2,000

BRUSSELS, Aug. 11.—German losses at Liege, including Sunday, were as follows: Killed, 2,000; wounded, 20,000; taken prisoners, 9,000. These figures were officially given out today by the Belgian war minister.

## RAINBOW IS SAFE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—The Canadian cruiser Rainbow, which left San Francisco early Saturday, is steaming northward, according to advices received here today. Captain Jansen of the schooner Klamath sighted the warship at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, 25 miles north of Point Reyes.

## SERVIANS INVADE BOSNIA

NISH, Serbia, Aug. 11.—Combined Serbian and Montenegrin forces are today overrunning the Austrian province of Bosnia, the Serbian war office announced today, defeating the Austrians everywhere with heavy losses. The invaders have occupied numerous towns. The Bosnians, they stated, were rising to help them.

## GERMANS BEATEN BACK

PARIS, Aug. 11.—German troops were reported to the war office today as being near Morhange, east of Metz, trying to penetrate the French frontier. The war office announced that German cavalry and mounted infantry had failed in its attempt to raid French territory near Luxemburg, the French repulsing them.

## GERMAN ADVANCE CHECKED

ANTWERP, Aug. 11.—German advance through Belgium upon the French frontier is believed here to be checked. It is stated officially that the Germans are entrenching along the river Ourthe. This is taken to mean that they meant to hold the ground they gained, but abandoned hope of making further progress. The Kaiser's general staff, it is believed, would try to find another route for entering France. Against the Germans who have already gained a foothold in Belgium it is expected the combined Belgian, French and British forces will take the offensive immediately.

## FRENCH EVACUATE

PARIS, Aug. 11.—The French troops who captured Mulhausen, Alsace, Saturday evacuated the city today. The official announcement was made by the minister of war.

The French invaders had been engaged with an attack on Neu Breisach, in the center of the main line of German frontier fortifications. While this fight was in progress, the Germans brought up reinforcements of such overwhelming strength that the French were forced back, first upon Mulhausen and then out of that city. They retired into the outskirts, where at the latest accounts they were making a determined stand. It is believed that a general battle is in progress.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—According to a dispatch to the Daily Mail the British have captured the Hamburg-American steamer Cap Ortegai, with \$6,000,000 in specie aboard. The liner left Buenos Ayres for Southampton July 16th. The Cap Ortegai is a vessel of 7,818 tons, 440 feet long, 52 feet beam and 29.8 draft.

## Nab 2 German Ships?

LONDON, Aug. 11.—That the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau had been captured by the combined British and French fleet, was given as an unconfirmed rumor in a local news agency dispatch from Rome today. An Athens dispatch to another agency reported that the cruisers had rounded Cape Matapan, Greece, and belief is expressed that the British and French warships were pursuing them.

## SMALL FORCE OF GERMANS IN LIEGE

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Belgian legation issued the following statement today: "Reports that the entire German army of the Meuse of 120,000 strong has entered Liege is false. Only a few thousands are in the city. The rest are still engaged in an unsuccessful effort to reduce the fortifications, which are still undamaged by the German bombardment. Transportation facilities between England and the continent are much improved. Arrangements have been made for two military trains daily between Paris and Boulogne, connecting the latter place with transchannel boats.

## England Raises Another Army

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Premier Asquith announced in the house of commons today that War Minister Lord Kitchener had ordered the volunteer army of 100,000 already raised by Great Britain supplemented by 100,000 more. This is taken as meaning that the entire British force will be sent to the continent where a considerable part of it has already landed. Lord Kitchener has the authority from parliament to raise a half million volunteers.
