WILL ENGLAND BE INVADED DURING THIS GREAT WAR

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—What are the chances of an invasion of England during the present war?
None, if ships win at sea; certain if they lose, is the answer of military and naval experts.
Not for 500 years, or since Sir Francis Drake swept the Spanish armada from the seas, has invading foot been set on British Isles. Yet there has never been a time when that possibility was not uppermost in the minds of England's rulers who looked apprehensively across the narrow British channel. Steam and modern machinery had considerably narrowed that barrier.
The great threat has previously been France. But England's fears of recent years have switched to Germany. The war office has been preparing for a German invasion for years.
Home guards were called to arms and drilled. Mock repulsion from the forts was enacted. Strings of marching men were thrown across the coast lines as a demonstration of what force might be summoned in such a crisis. And England satisfied itself that it was safe as long as its ships patrolled the channel.
That a naval defeat would leave the islands defenseless against invasion is regarded as a strong probability should Belgium and France fail to stay the onslaught of Teuton soldiers.

ST. PETERSBURG IS GOAL OF GERMANY'S BIG ARMY

The goal of the Germany army on its western march, St. Petersburg, is the realized dream of Peter the Great, the first czar who recognized the advance of civilization and the importance of commerce.
No sentimental weaknesses marked his career. At 17, with a Scotchman as his commanding officer, he made war on his half sister and established himself on the throne. Later he sent his own son to prison and saw him tortured to death to quell a revolt.
Traveling as a plain citizen, he visited other European countries and learned the secrets of their success. He worked as a shipbuilder, a clerk, an engineer.
Then he carried back the best experts he could find to advance his ambitions of making Russia more civilized. He built ships and promoted printing and education.
He won access to the Baltic by a war with Sweden, and he laid out St. Petersburg as his capital, offering great inducements to those who would live there. It was his ambition to make it the commercial capital of the Baltic.
GENEVA, Switzerland, via Paris, Aug. 14.—Italy has mobilized between 200,000 and 250,000 troops on the Swiss and Austrian frontiers, as a precautionary measure.

BULLETINS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.
—President Wilson is gravely considering the question of whether American bankers should be permitted to loan big sums of money to European nations engaged in war. Although a loan was made to Japan at the time of her war with Russia, the president fears that a misunderstanding might crop out if the precedent were followed at this time. J. P. Morgan & Co. desires to float a loan of several hundred thousand dollars to the French government.
LONDON, Aug. 14.—An unsuccessful attempt was made upon the life of King Albert of Belgium while he was directing the movements of his forces before Liege, according to the London News. The News said the paper had appealed to the Belgian minister of war for confirmation of the rumor, but at the time of publication had received no response.
EL PASO, Tex., Aug. 14.—Paralysis of the mining industry in the Southwest Mexico is threatened by the European war. The copper industry is said virtually to have been killed by the suspension of demand for crude metal in Europe. Now the gold-mining industry is threatened, due to the shortage of potassium cyanide, a necessary element in the extraction of gold.
LONDON, Aug. 14.—A telegram from Paris to the Central News says that the German troops today shot the mayor of Igney, a village between Luneville and Arricourt, on the French-German frontier.

TERRIBLE FORCE OF RIFLE AND CANNON ILLUSTRATED

With modern powder, a bullet will travel 2000 yards—over a mile—before it will drop a distance equal to the height of an ordinary man. Thus it is possible for infantry companies in the present war to sweep everything before them within one mile if a solid front attack is ordered. There is no safety zone whatsoever.

During the civil war, when Gettysburg was fought, and during the Napoleonic wars ended by Waterloo, such a thing as raiding fire artillery was not known. Today rapid fire artillery can be sighted and made effective at a distance of five miles. The shells are incomparably more effective than those of old artillery.

During the civil war President Lincoln often looked from his executive offices in the white house to the Virginia hills across the Potomac where the confederate army was entrenched from time to time. Today a sharpshooter using an ordinary navy infantry rifle, concealed on those Virginia hills, could pick off persons on the white house grounds, while artillery on those hills could raze the whole city of Washington in a few minutes.

Priest Wants to Save Army
ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 12.—Application for the restoration of his commission in the Russian army has been made by Father Bulatovich, a former officer of the guards, who is now superior of a monastery on Mount Athos, in the peninsula of Saloniki.
