OLYMPIA, Aug. 25.—You can't not use decoys this season to hunt duck or any other migratory game bird, according to State Warden and Fish Commissioner Darwin. The 1913 game code makes it unlawful to "deceive" game birds. Darwin also ruled today that shooting of blue grouse cannot be hunted until September 16, instead of September 1, as had been the case previously.


