Showing Up a Faker What Sheriff R. W. Jamieson Claims

In his campaign statement Sheriff Jamieson claims to have made a saving of \$12,918.45 in his two years' term under what was expended by Robert Longmire, the former sheriff.

Now the facts are: That Robert Longmire expended \$5,652.99 less during his term of office than was paid out for the same purposes in the last two years since Jamieson has been sheriff.

Proof That Jamieson Has Juggled Figures.

The official records show the cost of maintaining the sheriff's office under Robert Longmire as follows:

1911 \$16,082.04
1912 \$17,293.90

Total cost \$33,375.94

The cost of maintaining the same work identically during the last two years since Jamieson has been sheriff, is shown below in detail, followed by an explanation of the sheriff's expert juggler of figures which fools no one but himself.

Saving to the taxpayers by Longmire in two years \$ 5,684.07

What Jamieson neglected to include in his statement of expense in his effort to cover up his extravagance, was the cost of delinquent tax collections, motorcycle patrolmen, county police and Deputy Sheriff Ashby and Shortes. None of these items were included in his statements.

Why? Because the expense was charged to other accounts, although for years the collections of delinquent taxes was handled in the sheriff's office but were turned over to the treasurer's office for convenience. It cost the same to collect the 1913 and 1914 taxes as it did the 1911 and 1912.

Thus Jamieson would have you believe he was saving money.

Longmire had one motorcycle officer most of the time, occa-

sionally two, Jamieson always has two and sometimes three. No wonder he did not want this expense charged to his office.

Then comes the police officers. They are sleuths of the sheriff's office. They perform the "criminal" work (at least what little has been done) and yet these expenses and salaries are not charged to the sheriff's office, but to a sundry account of the county commissioners.

Murderers, Robbers and Thieves have been plying their trade with impunity during Jamieson's term of office. When Longmire was sheriff only one murderer escaped him. However, Jamieson does not claim efficiency in office. He is honest in this particular. What he claims is great economy.

By charging the expenses of his office to other accounts or departments, it naturally does not show against his extravagance. Robert Longmire paid and has charged to his account every cent expended during his term of office.

Therefore the apparent difference of \$12,018.45 in favor of Jamieson is a deliberate fraud.

How many prisoners save the county \$3,000 on feeding prisoners? Sheriff Jamieson claimed in his campaign literature two years ago that he would abolish the "time honored" custom of having the sheriff feed the prisoners; but as soon as he took office he induced Chairman W. H. Reed of the County Commissioners, to let him have the contract to feed the prisoners at the rate paid in the past. (The conversations between Jamieson and Mr. Reed took place in the sheriff's office and was heard plainly by half a dozen people.) Some of the sheriff's own deputies stand ready to swear to this fact, which has been repeatedly alleged by Mr. Reed.

Did Robert Longmire graft \$11,717 feeding prisoners? Mr. Longmire was accused by one of his employees of grafting \$11,717 while sheriff in 1911 and 1912. When Mr. Jamieson took office he gave the following report to the Ledger regarding the alleged graft:

Tacoma Daily Ledger, Monday, Feb. 3, 1913. "Reed and Jamieson Breach is Widened. Takes Longmire's Part. Mr. Reed knows that the statement that Mr. Longmire made \$11,717 profit in his feeding the prisoners in two years is a deliberate, premeditated, malicious lie, but he keeps on repeating and circulating this falsehood, although he has several times had his attention called to the fact that the total amount paid to Mr. Longmire was less than the alleged profit."

These were the actual words reported by the Ledger as coming from Mr. Jamieson. Why then does Mr. Jamieson use in his campaign the statement that Longmire grafted \$11,717 in feeding prisoners, when he knows it is an absolute falsehood. In fact, \$11,717 was more than the whole amount paid to Longmire by the commissioners for feeding the prisoners during his entire term of sheriff in 1911 and 1912.
