

FIND BODY IN FREIGHT CAR

NORTH YAKIMA, Dec. 5.—A young man, identified by letters and other papers as Stephen Tucker, 27, was found in a refrigerator car in a westbound Northern Pacific train at Toppenish today with his skull fractured in three places from blows with a coupling pin. He died at the moment of the discovery. His mother lives in Oklahoma and a sister in Waldport, Ore.

ENGLAND CONSIDERED WAR IN 1909, REPORTS PROVE

BERLIN, Dec. 5.—The following information is given out by the official bureau: A special dispatch from Gotherburg, Sweden, says a South Danish commercial newspaper reports that in 1909 Great Britain threw out a feeler to Holland about the possibility of concluding a military convention. Holland declined, because such a course would be incompatible with her neutrality. As a reply to Holland, the Anglo-Belgian agreement was concluded, whereupon Holland fortified Flushing.

BELGRADE OCCUPIED BY THE AUSTRIANS; NO OPPOSITION

VIENNA, Dec. 5.—"The formal occupation of Belgrade occurred yesterday with appropriate ceremonies," according to an announcement made here today. "The further advance of the Austrian troops into Northern Serbia has been unopposed."

NEWS OF OIL DEVELOPMENT

"The Tacoma Oil company has six 40-acre tracts and two twenties right in the heart of the oil district."—F. A. Terry.

"Development is going forward at a rapid pace, and that I expect good news for stockholders of Tenino-Little Rock Oil company, at an early date."—J. M. Cattanauch.

"The shale and oil sands in the Globe well down to the depth of 270 feet are perfect, and they were beyond my expectations. I consider, gentlemen, that all you'll have to do is to go to the depth of 2,700 feet and you'll get a gusher that will surprise the Northwest."—Wm. Ferris, practical and expert geologist.

"From knowledge obtained from a well drilled by another company in this same formation, J. A. Paulhamus, president of the Crescent Oil company, expects to strike the cap rock overlying the oil sands at about 435 feet. The thickness of this rock of course is unknown and what lies under it is unknown. Mr. Paulhamus says, however, that we are now in the oil formation and that in his own mind he knows that the oil sand is some place beneath the drill. He believes that he is going to strike it at between 450 or 500 feet."—J. B. Duyrea.

"Last year the U. S. government had their expert, Mr. Chas. T. Lupton, make an extensive report on the oil fields in Washington, and I am informed that they are sending an expert into the Tenino field for more information. The government might just as well give the new man the steady job of seeking information in this big new field, for developments are surely being started there, and what will be complete information today will be a back number tomorrow. The Olympia-Tenino field is the big new thing, and I am pleased to have the government taking notice so soon," said Emery C. Williamson today.

OPPOSE BIGGER ARMY PROPOSAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 5.—The administration is opposing Congressman Gardner, who wants congress to institute an investigation of our military preparedness. The rules committee is being used to block the game. The unpreparedness of the United States for war really needs no proof, but the Massachusetts representative would like to summon a lot of military people and get the testimony before the country for educational purposes. The substance of any testimony they might give is in fact contained in practically every annual report made by the war branches of the government. The president, however, is co-operating with Chairman Henry of the rules committee, who has announced that military men cannot talk unless they are summoned by the committee, which would require a vote by the committee, which is equivalent to requiring the committee to act favorably before the testimony is presented on a subject to which the administration is opposed.

Iron Casing Won't Do for the Globe Well

A shipment of iron casing, which we reported as having arrived for the Globe well near Little Rock was turned down by the head driller, and the rig is idle until another shipment of steel casing arrives, which should be Sunday or Monday at the latest.

Our driller refused to use this iron casing, and we supported him, for these reasons:

First, the casing is forced into the bore by hydraulic pressure of 180,000 pounds, 90 TONS. The Globe Well is a 14-inch hole and there was danger of the iron casing buckling under the strain.

Second, the drill is in a formation just now that is liable to cave-ins, and gas pressure is frequently encountered. Even if put down successfully now, the iron casing might later yield to the strain somewhere and a lot of work would have to be done over again at big expense.
