

PROPOSE CHANGES IN PRIMARY LAW

Sweeping changes in the primary laws of Washington are proposed by the republicans. Republican State Chairman Millard T. Hartson has drawn up a bill to submit to the next legislature. It will be discussed next Friday, when the state committee and legislators from all over the state come to Tacoma for a meeting and banquet tendered by the Pierce county legislative delegation.

Two primaries each biennium are proposed. One would elect delegates to the county convention, and the other would nominate candidates for office. Voters would register by parties. Candidates would have to subscribe to the national platform of the party with which they affiliate, and promise to carry out its principles.

Delay Divorce Cases 30 Days

Divorce hearings hereafter will not be held until 30 days after filing of the complaint, it was decided at a conference of Pierce county judges yesterday. The jurists voted to retain the present system of handling other cases, with the exception that only two courts will have juries. Judge Card today will assume criminal court work, changing rooms with Judge Clifford.
