

AUTOS HAVE PROMINENT PLACE IN EXPOSITION

After several weeks of careful planning upon the part of the management and a week of decorating and preparing of exhibits, the fourth annual Manufacturers' Household and Auto exposition opens at the Glide rink, South 12th and L streets, at 7 o'clock tonight. The big rink has been transformed into a blaze of light and color, and it is expected that hundreds of persons will be in attendance.

Yaudiville, band concerts, minstrel songsters, vocal and instrumental solos, mannikin performances and a glass-blowers' exhibition are only a part of what is promised. This entertainment will continue through the week.

An automobile exhibit is a prominent part of the big show. Almost every auto dealer in the city has entered his latest model and accessory dealers will have on display the latest appliances for cheaper operation of a machine.

The show will be open in the afternoons from 1 to 5:30 o'clock and in the evenings from 7 until 11 o'clock, except Saturday, the closing night, when the show will be alive until midnight with a big carnival jubilee.

2 BURGLARS MAKE DARING ESCAPES

A burglar was discovered robbing the home of W. P. Lawrence, a retired merchant, 3201 North 28th street, last night. Lawrence pursued him, clad only in his pajamas, and beat him over the head with a parasol.

Another robber was caught in the act of burglarizing the home of F. L. Spear, 902 North L st., Saturday night, and escaped after Mrs. Spear had grabbed his coat-tails and pursued him through the front door and out on the front porch.

Lawrence was asleep last night when the burglar entered. The scraping of a pantry window, as the burglar entered, awakened Lawrence, and he started downstairs, seizing a parasol as the handiest weapon that he could find.

The thief made a dash for the back door, Lawrence at his heels. His chin caught on a clothes line outside and he spun through the air. Lawrence landed one good blow on the burglar's head as the man fell, but he managed to escape.

At the Spear home, the thief Saturday night had stolen a solid gold bead necklace and gold watch, when the Spears came home and interrupted him. He ran past Mr. and Mrs. Spear to the front door. Mrs. Spear in pursuit. While Mrs. Spear held his coat-tails, the burglar made a lunge off the front porch, and disappeared into the fog.

CITY FATHERS HEAR WATER CO. OFFER

Mayor Fawcett and the city commission, together with engineers of the water department and representatives of the Tacoma Water Supply company, met in the mayor's office at 1 o'clock this afternoon to discuss the water company's proposal to sell out to the city for \$280,000.

Engineers of the city have examined the North End springs system of the Tacoma Water company and have reported that the price demanded of the city was too high. It would cost \$42,000 to connect the city system with the North End system. The private water company's franchise expires in seven years. Today's meeting was open to the public, on Mayor Fawcett's demand.
