HERE'S A SIMPLE EXERCISE FOR BROADENING SHOULDERS THAT IS PROMISED TO WORK WONDERS

World's Champion Wrestler. Nearly everyone admires broad shoulders and an erect carriage. A little experience of my own will show you how they can be attained.

When I was about 13 years of age Robert Fitzsimmons was creating a big sensation, and the newspapers were elaborating upon his broad shoulders, slim waist and underpinning. To me that was the ideal physique. I procured a picture of "Fitz" and took it home to admire.

Gradually I began to broaden out across the shoulders, but I possessed the same slim leg. I took up wrestling, and here the thick legs of a Gotch were necessary. Road work gave them to me.

But I will explain how I attained broad shoulders. Stand in front of a mirror, raise your arms above your head and take a deep breath. Lower your arms slowly and horizontally until they are parallel with your shoulders. Then extend your latissimus dorsi muscles (the muscles that run down the back of the body from the arms just back of the arm pits). The control of these muscles may not be easy at first, but persevere.

Then bring the arms slowly to your sides, keeping the muscles under the arms rigid. This will gradually widen the distance between your shoulder blades and allow them freer play than before.
