WON'T REPEAL MOTHERS' PENSION LAW, IS PROMISE

OLYMPIA, Jan. 23.—Senators W. S. Davis and H. H. Phipps, before a meeting of W. C. T. U. members from Thurston and Lewis counties called to protest the repeal of the mothers' pension law, said there was little likelihood of the law being repealed, but that it undoubtedly would be amended in protection against immigration simply to enjoy its benefits.

The proposed remedy is to require five years' residence in the state in order to benefit by the law and to place a ban on divorced women. Mr. Davis says a canvass of the senate shows a majority sentiment against repeal.

Senator Lincoln Davis has filed a bill for introduction in the senate making it gross misdemeanor to beat a hotel bill, removal of baggage being prima facie evidence that such offense is contemplated.
