SEATTLE, Feb. 10.—Fire today destroyed the \$35,000 plant of the Bailey-Dubois Sash and Door Manufacturing company at 4727 Sixth avenue south early this morning. While fighting the flames which burned fiercely in the hardwood stock of the plant, J. Lugenfelder, a fireman of Hose company No. 27 and living at 943 Twenty-ninth avenue south, suffered a broken leg and severe bruises when a pile of lumber fell on him. The fire which is thought to have originated by spontaneous combustion in the lumber room defied all efforts of the fire department and threatened for a time the big plant of the A. F. Ghiglione & Sons, macaroni manufacturers at 4715 Sixth avenue south.
