ACTRESS' MARRIAGE SHATTERED BY LAW; TESTS 'WORD OF HONOR'



LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 10.—A man's word is more binding than laws that deal with man's love for woman, believes Maude Armfield, former chorus girl, and now moving picture actress here, who is suing Bryant Howard, Jr., a San Diego millionaire, for \$500,000 in breach of promise. She is putting her belief to test in court. The law dealing with the love of men and maids permitted an annulment of her alleged marriage with Howard because his divorce from his former wife had not been secured. This the girl sets forth in affidavits. But what the law could not enforce the young millionaire's alleged "word of honor" can, believes Maude Armfield, and this promise, she says, was that he pledged himself to remarry her as soon as he could legally. "Bryant Howard loved me," she said. "He vowed he would always love me, and said many times, in the presence of witnesses, that he would remarry me as soon as he could lawfully." Mrs. Medora H. Howard, mother of the defendant, was subpoenaed as an important witness, since Miss Armfield asserted that her testimony she could not properly present her case. Mrs. Howard, she says, heard her son protest his love for the actress, and insist time after time that he would remarry her. Mrs. Howard, the mother, also paid the expenses when Margaret, the child, was born to the girl who wants \$500,000 bail. Young Howard's wealth is estimated at close to \$1,000,000.

PRESIDENT SENDS INVENTOR'S NIECE TO CHRISTEN SUBMRRINE

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 11.—In 1771 David Bushnell, a student at Yale, allowed a "foolish vision" to agitate him. He conceived the notion that a vessel might be built which could travel under water and destroy other ships. He went to work on the idea, and he became the inventor of the first submarine. A few days ago David Bushnell's great grand-niece came here across the continent at the invitation of President Wilson to christen the \$1,000,000 U. S. submarine tender "Bushnell" constructed in a local shipyard. She is Miss Esculine W. Bushnell of La Grange, Ill. It seemed particularly fitting to President Wilson and Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels that a relative of the distinguished inventor should honor his memory and achievement for the nation. This event has served to call attention again to a happening of great importance in the development of naval warfare that took place in 1775, soon after the outbreak of the Revolutionary war. David Bushnell had completed his submarine, a vessel propelled by hand. It was named the Turtle. When a British squadron blockaded New York harbor, Israel Putnam, the American general, sent for Bushnell and it was decided to use his new craft in attacking the flagship of Admiral Howe, the British commander.
