BOY OF 14 FRANCE'S "LITTLE CORPORAL": WOUNDED TWO TIMES

CALAIS, France, Jan. 23 (By Mail).—The latest "little corporal" of France, aged 14 years, wounded twice and captor of seven German soldiers, has received his stripes, and is now a full-fledged non-commissioned officer in the army of Joffre.

The new hero—and he's pretty much of a hero in France just now—is named Gustave Chatain and he is the son of a market gardener at Senlis.

He was working in his father's field when the 92nd regiment passed on its way to the front. Gustave threw down his spade and fell in. Near Pontenoy he was walking along a road when a little girl of his own age ran up breathless and told him that seven German soldiers were in her home, eating and drinking whatever the place afforded after first binding the parents of the child.

The little soldier—height, 4 feet 3 inches—discovered their rifles stacked in the yard. He carefully hid six of them and marched into the house with the seventh in his hand. Leveling the gun at the seven foemen he ordered them to march ahead of him. They obeyed, the official reports say, and he brought them into camp as prisoners of war.

Gustave was shot in the chest and at the same moment hurled high into the air by the explosion of a nearby shell, breaking several ribs in the fall. That evening in the field hospital his colonel came to him and promoted him corporal. "You are the second Little Corporal of France," he said, "and the army is very proud of you."

Then Gustave was sent back to Paris, where he became the pet of the capital. By the time this reaches the United States the little corporal will be back on the firing line and with him will go his toy train of cars.


