

GERMANS CAPTURE 26,000 RUSSIANS FOR THE KAISER

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Twenty-six thousand Russian troops, 20 big cannons, 30 machine guns and a large quantity of war material were captured by the Germans in East Prussia in the sudden offensive which has sent the Czar's force of invaders hurriedly back in the direction of their own border. This is the assertion made in a dispatch received here from Berlin today, which adds that the Kaiser was in the vicinity of the operation in person.

Despite this reverse, which is the second suffered in the same vicinity, the Russian offensive

against the Austrians in the Carpathians continues and large reinforcements are being rushed into the mountains from all directions by the Czar's commander-in-chief, according to an official report from Vienna.

Reports regarding the situation in Russian Poland are confusing. A Paris dispatch says authentic news has been received there of the complete failure of the German offensive in Poland, while a Berlin communication says the Russians are preparing to fall back on their second line of defenses before Warsaw.

SIR ROGER SAYS HE HAS PROOF OF DEATH THREAT

BERLIN, Feb. 13.—(By wireless to Sayville, L. I.)—According to a story given out by a news agency, Sir Roger Casement, leader of the Separatist faction in Ireland, has published an open letter declaring that he has documentary proof that the British government is in a conspiracy to have him captured or killed.

The letter was written to Sir Edward Grey, British secretary of state for foreign affairs. Sir Roger charges that British officials promised his man servant, Alder Christenson, \$25,000 if he would lure Sir Roger to a place where he could either be "knocked in the head" or carried away in a ship.

AUDITORIUM FIRED 4 TIMES IN A DAY

LONG BEACH, Cal., Feb. 13.—The first of four attempts to burn the newly rebuilt municipal auditorium here was made yesterday when 2,500 people were in the structure attending Lincoln day services by the Illinois State society. Smoke was issuing from the tower and a man outside ran in with the cry of "fire."

The crowd rushed to the doors in panic but was quieted when

the band played "Illinois." Paint soaked rags and a bottle of oil were found in the tower.

Three other times during the day fire started in the building. William M. Morton, who calls himself "a friend of all the people," was arrested on a vagrancy charge and is held as a suspect. The auditorium collapsed March 24, 1913, and 40 people were killed.

\$105,000 LOSS IN ALBANY, OR. FIRE

ALBANY, Ore., Feb. 13.—A loss of \$105,500 was caused by a fire which completely gutted the Wallace block, containing the big Hamilton store, and damaged adjoining buildings and stocks of other stores in the heart of Albany's business district yesterday afternoon. The damage is covered by \$69,700 insurance, most of the smaller losses of the fire being fully insured.

Although it burned for almost two hours before firemen gained control, the blaze was confined to the two-story brick building owned by Dr. J. P. Wallace, and a two-story brick adjoining it on the west, owned by Judge Percy R. Kelly. The Wallace block was entirely gutted and, except the brick walls, is a mass of debris. The Kelly building also suffered considerable damage.

MAKES IT DEFINITE ALL RIGHT

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore., Feb. 13.—Oregon women are not to be permitted to serve on juries. Neither will they be compelled to serve.

The house has indefinitely postponed the Huston bill, which would have made it possible—but not compulsory—for women to serve on trial juries.

The senate a week ago defeated a bill to make it compulsory—but not optional—for women to serve.

In the house the plea was made that if women were to serve on juries at all they should be compelled to serve if summoned and not be given the option of claiming exemption on account of their sex, as the bill provided. In the senate the plea was made that women should not be compelled to do jury duty, but that it should be made optional with them.

Mine Guard Shot Down

BUTTE, Mont., Feb. 13.—Thomas Monroe, a mine guard, is dying here today as the result of two bullet wounds. He was shot last night by Harry Robinson, an I. W. W., who walked up to Monroe and deliberately placed the muzzle of a revolver close to the guard's body, pulling the trigger. Robinson was arrested on the spot as Monroe fell. He wrenched his arm loose from the policeman's grasp to fire three more shots at the prostrate form of the miner.

WEALTHY MAN IS KILLED BY AUTO

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Feb. 13.—Edward Gerber, one of the best known and wealthiest coal operators in the Northwest, last night was crushed to death under the steering wheel of his heavy automobile, which somersaulted while Gerber was speeding along the county road from Great Falls to his home at Sand Coulee. Two girls with Gerber were thrown clear of the machine and they ran two miles to get help.

BERLIN JOYOUS OVER THE REPORT OF NEW VICTORY

BERLIN, Feb. 13.—(Via London)—The report that Field Marshal von Hindenburg has won another decisive victory over Russians in East Prussia has thrown Berlin into joyous excitement. The people were surprised by the announcement that the German troops are driving the Russians from the Mazurian lake district. Attention for the last two

weeks has been centered chiefly along the Warsaw front. Flags are waving today and the city has a holiday air as result of the victory. It is said that von Hindenburg had eight army corps for the purpose of vanquishing the Russians.

The battle was fought under the observation of Emperor William.

OLYMPIA, Feb. 13.—Miss Florence Lister, only daughter of the executive mansion, was formally ushered into society yesterday as the season's first debutante.

Her reception, given by Governor and Mrs. Ernest Lister, proved the most brilliant affair ever held in Olympia. Hundreds motored from Tacoma early in the day to attend the reception.

With Miss Lister and her mother, in the receiving line, was

Miss Harriet Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Smith of Tacoma, who is a close girlhood chum of Miss Lister.

The debutante was charmingly gowned. She wore a crown of pink satin roses and carried a bouquet of huge chateaus.

The rooms were gorgeous in flowers. Carnations and roses and long twining festoons of woodland greenery were used to carry out an effective color scheme.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 13.—Germany and Austria, according to word reaching here, have declared the independence of Poland, to become effective tomorrow when a convention will be held in Cracow for the purpose of choosing a king. Archduke Carl Stephen of Austria is said to be a likely candidate.
