GERMANS BLOW TRENCH; GAIN OVER BRITISH

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Increasing German activity in the vicinity of Ypres is reported today in Paris dispatches. That the Germans destroyed a British trench with mines Sunday and had advanced their lines, was admitted. This was offset, the dispatches said, by the British victory at Labasse. One dispatch declared that the British had successfully mined a German trench near Givenechy and that the Germans had been forced to retire along the canal.

DIPHTHERIA IN SOUTH TACOMA

With seven cases of diphtheria in South Tacoma, City Health Officer Wall declared today that he believed the epidemic had been ended. The seven cases, all among the children, developed Saturday and Sunday. A squad of inspectors fumigated the Edison school from basement to attic.

ACCUSED JUDGE DENIES CHARGES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 23.—Federal Judge A. G. Dayton of Virginia testified before the investigating board of the house judiciary committee nearly 18 hours in denial of impeachment charges. He denied that he had ever shown favoritism for the railroads and emphatically stated that in decisions against the United Mine Workers of America he had only carried out the law without any prejudice against union labor.

COLONIAL BALL

PUYALLUP, Feb. 23.—Puyallup lived again in Colonial times last night, when members and guests of the Puyallup Women's club enjoyed a Colonial ball and banquet commemorating Washington. More than 200 persons, attired in Colonial costume, attended. The Commercial club, where the affair was held, was appropriately decorated in greens and flags.


TODAY'S ODDEST STORY

GERMANS THREATEN RUSSIAN FORTRESS

PETROGRAD, Feb. 23.—That the Germans are making a desperate effort to reach Novogeorgiewsk, the Russian stronghold guarding the northern approaches to Warsaw, is admitted today by the war office. The Germans are heavily reinforced. The war office declared that it did not view with alarm the new movement. Government officials did not conceal the fact that Russians have met with serious reverses in Prussia but insisted that the defeat was not as crushing as Berlin indicated.

SOME HUGE JOB EACH SUBMARINE HAS IN BLOCKADE



Map of the British Isles' danger zone established by the kaiser, extending in a belt 100 miles out from the coast line. The water surrounding the isles is blocked into 100 miles square, giving each of Germany's 50 submarines 1,000 square miles to patrol, with the exception of the southern portion, where traffic is greater, and two, three or more submarines are in use for every 100 miles of coast line.

GRANTED DIVORCE

Mrs. Leola Ravetti got a divorce from Armand Ravetti, who, she said, had uttered "cruel and cutting things" about her and had caused her to believe he intended to kidnap their 2-year-old son, Lucius, after the parents had separated.

DAIRY LOSS IS NOT ALARMING

Despite assertions of dairymen that they would lose at least one-half of their stock through the tuberculin test of cattle, recently ordered by the Tacoma council, Dr. R. A. Button, city milk and meat inspector, today announced that the loss would be only between 10 and 15 per cent. "I have already given the tuberculin test to 2,500 cows, and have found a little more than 10 per cent reactive," said Dr. Button today. A "reactive" result of a test proves that the animal is tubercular.

ELKS LAY CORNERSTONE FOR THEIR \$140,000 CLUB ROOMS

While 500 Elks stood with bared heads in the chill evening breeze, the cornerstone of a new club building—the Elks' club—was laid last evening. It was the first step towards actual construction of the Elks' \$140,000 structure, at 7th and Cliff avenue. The occasion caused a monster crowd of spectators to gather. Henry W. Parrott, of Bellingham, district deputy exalted ruler, read the cornerstone-laying ritual. Superior Judge Chapman dedicated the stone. After a parade through the downtown streets, the Elks gathered in their old club rooms for the annual Washington's birthday banquet. Addresses and music featured the evening. Tacoma Elks will go to Olympia Thursday night to take part in the Olympia Elks' indoor carnival, as return courtesy to the Olympia Elks' band, which came to Tacoma last night.
