DRILLING TO BE RESUMED BY CRESCENT

SEATTLE, March 5.—In a statement here today President John C. Slater of the Crescent Oil Co., Tenino, explained away the mystery which has shrouded recent activities a Tenino's "discovery hole." According to Slater, the work of replacing casing and a badly smashed "shoe" is practically completed. Tomorrow the drill will again be put in motion, he says.

This, he says, has delayed the work.

Slater is confident the Crescent well will soon be producing oil in large quantities. This may be accomplished in 10 days, or it may be a matter of weeks, he believes.

In the course of two weeks to a month the drill will have bored to a depth of 1,886 feet, the limit set for drilling operations. If a sufficient quantity of oil is not being brought up then the work probably will be abandoned.

But at present there is no "if" in Slater's vocabulary. It would not surprise him, he says, if paying oil is uncovered at considerably less than the allotted 1,886 feet.

The drill is now down 1,780 feet. No drilling has been done since Feb. 15, when Slater and others took over the company. At the time the property was transferred, according to Slater, the new owners were not informed as to the true conditions of the casing.

The well, Slater says, the "shoe" and casing were O. K.; that there was nothing to interfere with the work going right ahead.

At the risk of weakening the sides so as to cause a cave-in, the casing was pulled up last week, he says.

"We are selling no stock," Slater stated. "Nor will shares be sold after we get the oil in commercial quantities."
