Figures In Frustrated Plot to Wreck Church



Here are the three clever detectives who, resorting to the disguise of dime novel sleuths, frustrated a gigantic bomb plot to wreck St. Patrick's cathedral in New York and kill the Rockefellers, Carnegies, Vanderbilts and numerous other millionaires. POLITICAL GANGMEN FACE TRIAL

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 8.—The bold and desperate political gang of Terre Haute stands humbled today before the court. With a record of crime that would have sent them to the state penitentiary and the county jail by dozens, the gang put across its candidate for judge of the circuit court at the election last fall.

See Leavenworth Ahead. The charge is conspiracy to corrupt the election of Nov. 3 last at which a United States senator and congressman were elected. To put across their local slate, the gangsters, it is charged, conspired to deprive the government and citizens of the United States of their right to an honest election for these offices.

Many of the 88 gangsters who have pleaded guilty, it is expected, will be among the hundreds of witnesses called by District Attorney Frank C. Dailey for the government.

Those who have made anarchy in Terre Haute now feel the stern hand of the nation's inflexible law. Beyond the marble columns of the federal court they see the iron bars of Leavenworth prison.

Standing out among those who are in court for trial is Mayor Donn M. Roberts, czar of the gang. Roberts is accused of levying assessments on proprietors of gambling houses, saloons, and dance halls—which flourish rankly in Terre Haute—to pay the expenses of about 3000 false registrations. He is accused of demanding that only men he could buy be placed on an election board; of hiring men to haul repeaters and ordering citizens who tried to block his schemes thrown into jail.

Judge Eli H. Redman is a defendant who will loom up in the trial. He's the man who sent Charles W. Clogston, fighting editor of the Terre Haute Post, to jail for calling Redman's grand jury "gang-picked."

L. A. Hurt, 34 years old, is in the county jail today charged with stabbing John Marsden, 23, at Wilkeson, in a street fight Saturday night. Hurt says he stabbed Marsden in self-defense, after he had been attacked from behind. Hurt was captured after some hours by deputy sheriffs, who found him in Wilkeson creek, up to his head in water and suffering from cramps and chills. He was also wounded in the melee, and 56 stitches were necessary.

GRECION NATIAN IS FACING CRISIS, CABINET RESIGNS

LONDON, March 8.—The political affairs of the Grecian nation are on the brink of a crisis. The king, with his relation to the emperor of Germany through marriage, is exerting his influence to preserve the neutrality of the country. His views clashed with those of M. Venizelos, premier, who with the Grecian cabinet, has resigned from his post on that account. It is mentioned in Paris papers that Greece is desirous of being in at the death of Turkey and is anxious to take over Smyrna and colonies on the Anatolian coast. As M. Venizelos has sympathy with the allies, many conjectures are being made today as to the probable outcome of the crisis. Came Out Even by Chopping a Little Although Commissioner Mills allowed the police and fire departments to exceed their budget estimates during 1914 to the extent of \$20,300, he managed to eliminate proposed improvements to his departments, and cut expenses in other branches of his office, so that he came out \$5,000 beneath his budget for the year.
