"Just get us a big brother or a big sister—some one to back us—and watch us do the square thing," said Sullivan.

"Sure, all we want is a chance," agreed the others.

And even Detectives Egan and O'Connor, hardened coppers, think they ought to get it.

# ARREST GERMAN CONSUL

SEATTLE, March 18. — Dr. Wilhelm Mueller, Imperial German consul, and his secretary, B. M. Schultz, were served with warrants of arrest at the consulate yesterday on informations charging them with conspiracy in attempting to buy business secrets of the Seattle Construction & Dry Dock Co. by corruptly influencing an employee.

Prosecuting Attorney Lundin says evidence is in his hands to show that the German officials sought information concerning alleged shipments of submarine parts to Great Britain through a Vancouver firm.

For this information, Mr. Lundin charges, Consul Mueller was willing to pay a large sum to John Murdock, an assistant shipping clerk for the Seattle Construction & Dry Dock Co.

Two Make Affidavits.

Murdock and Dan Tarnisasky, a private detective, were placed under arrest Tuesday night charged with the theft of nine bills of lading, taken from the files of the Seattle Construction & Dry Dock Co.

They were released yesterday morning when both made affidavits telling in detail all that occurred between them and Consul Mueller and his secretary.

That the outgoing shipment of all material from the Seattle Construction & Dry Dock Co. have been watched closely by secret agents of European governments has been known to the officials of that company for some time.

Find Bills in Bed.

Several days ago bills of lading were missed, and after some investigation, the company's detectives laid the absence of the bills to the assistant shipping clerk, Murdock. On Monday a warrant was issued charging Richard Roe and John Doe with grand larceny, while Murdock and Tarnisasky were being closely watched.

It was understood that Tarnisasky and Murdock would appear at the German consulate to negotiate the sale of copies of the bills Tuesday evening. Special Agent Fred M. Lathe, of the prosecuting attorney's office, awaited their appearance at the consulate with warrants. Tarnisasky put in an appearance and was promptly arrested. Murdock could not be found. Following Tarnisasky's arrest, Lathe went to Murdock's home in South Park and located him there. A search of Murdock's room revealed the missing bills of lading hidden under a mattress.

## Loses Life In Fire; \$42,000 Plant Burns

With a loss estimated at \$42,000, the Eagle Macaroni Manufacturing Co.'s plant, 27th and Pacific avenue, was burned to the ground early this morning, taking with it five small cottages on 27th street, closely adjoining the factory.

Andrew E. Wilson, 116 South 27th street, who owned four of the five cottages, and who was aroused from slumber to find his possessions in imminent danger of total destruction, died from excitement while trying to assist firemen in preventing the spread of fire.

The macaroni plant was valued at \$25,000. Fire started at 1:40 a. m. in a rear room of the factory, and before fire apparatus arrived from the nearest station, the entire four-story frame building was in flames.

A strong southwest wind forced the fire through the entire block with incredible speed, and most of the persons whose homes were burned did not even have sufficient clothing to protect them from the chilly night air.

Those who lost their homes and possessions are Frank Platt, 108 27th street; J. F. Carr, 106 27th street; Andrew E. Wilson, 116 27th street; W. W. Wood, 118 27th street and Guy E. Christlawn, 110 27th street.

The factory was covered by three-fourths insurance. It will probably be rebuilt. It is owned by Joseph Magagnoli, Julia Magagnoli and Alfredo Giambastiani.

Fire Marshal Cantler today announced that the fire was undoubtedly caused by spontaneous combustion in the stock room.

# TELLS POOR HOW TO LIMIT FAMILIES; IS PROSECUTED

NEW YORK, March 18.—William Sanger and his wife Margaret, who call herself "The Woman Rebel," are both lawbreakers as the law stands today in the United States. You may approve of the law they broke and think, perhaps, that they should be punished.

But if you are a husband and have a wife you love or if you are a woman who cares for her husband your whole being will protest against the bringing of a fugitive from justice back within the jurisdiction of the law by torture of the loved one left behind.

And that is what the state of New York has succeeded in doing. For Margaret Sanger returned by her husband's arrest as the result of her lawbreaking is coming back from England.

Founda Magazine.

Margaret Sanger is a highly intelligent woman, a trained nurse who three years ago made up her mind that the greatest of all evils of poverty is the unlimited family. Last year she founded a paper called "The Woman Rebel" in which she told of the formation of a birth-control league and offered to those who wanted such information a leaflet called "Family Limitation."

I saw the four issues of this paper before it was suppressed. I have seen the pamphlet, "Family Limitation," of which 100,000 have been circulated in this country. The pamphlet contained such information regarding birth control as nearly every family physician dispenses to his women patients. Margaret Sanger says that she undertook to place such information—already surreptitiously at the disposal of everybody with the price—before the poor, who she thinks have the greatest need of it.

And she maintains that her arrest, and her husband's arrest, whatever their legal aspect, is actually just the working out of the double standard of law in this country—one law for the rich and another law for the poor.

Following her arrest on the charge of circulating obscene literature, Mrs. Sanger was released without bail and went to England, where she is now working. Margaret Sanger had to spend the night in jail.

Comstock advised the young architect to plead guilty and promised him a suspended sentence if he would make such a plea. This Sanger refused to do.

Following his night in jail Sanger was bailed out, and backed by the Free Speech league and with the support of the radical "The Masses," he is preparing to fight for his constitutional rights of free speech.

Meantime, however, Comstock's ruse has worked, for Margaret Sanger has written to say that she is unwilling that her husband should be sent to prison in her place and that she is coming back

to New York to stand trial beside him.

William Sanger, who is married to the Woman Rebel, took no part in this propaganda.

He is an architect and decorator. After his wife fled to London he received a visit from a man who announced himself as one of Mrs. Sanger's friends, and said that she had promised him one of the leaflets on family limitation. Sanger on the earnest plea of his visitor consented to look through her desk. He found one and gave it to the "friend."

The next time William Sanger saw this family "friend" was when he returned with Anthony Comstock and a search warrant, and this self-appointed guardian of New York morals proceeded to turn Sanger's studio inside out. He arrested

## Pribilof Islands Go Dry By Degree

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 19.—Under the law charging the department of commerce with the administration of the Pribilof Islands, Secretary Redfield has just decreed the territory shall hereafter be virtually "dry."

No alcohol or alcoholic liquors of any kind are to be landed except by the authority of the secretary of commerce or the commissioner of fisheries. The agent on each island is to be the sole custodian of all government supplies of such articles and will be held personally responsible for their proper use. The making of "quaws" by the natives is prohibited.



## WILL BE FASTEST COURSE

Tacoma is to have the fastest speedway in the world!

Plans have been drawn and contract let for the planking of the entire surface of the present Tacoma speedway. Specifications call for planks on edge to be laid at a width of 50 feet the entire distance of the present track. The specifications call for an angle of 30 degrees on the straight-aways and parallel with the track on the curves. After the entire track has been surfaced with plank, a coating of liquid asphalt will be given the surface so that there will be no possibility of cars skidding.

In talking with drivers it was found that the only complaint made was that the asphalt surface now being used is more or less rough in places. By using planks on edge Tacoma will have set a world's speed work for speedway events.

This immense work has been made possible to a large extent by the co-operation of the Addison-Hill Lumber company of Tacoma, who have entered into a contract with the Speedway association to do the necessary work on the track and have the entire job finished by June 1 of this year.
