Why, I suspect that when Noah got the ark under way men came to him and scoffed, as they scoff at the advocate of a big navy, saying: "Why do you build this ship?"



RUSSIANS FLEE IN A WILD ROUT

U. S. NOTE TO JAPAN WEIGHTY

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 23.—The recent note of the U. S. to Japan involved most weighty matters, President Wilson said today. He would not make known its contents until it reached Japan, but it is known that that country was firmly asked to state its intentions in connection with the present negotiations with China. The report from Tokio that the contents of the note were of minor importance was emphatically denied by the president.


McMILLANS TAKE OVER DRUGSTORE, NO. 3 FOR THEM
