Henry Starr

This is "Lone" Starr as he appeared when arrested for his first express robbery at Nowata, Okla., in 1891.

The pursuing party the following day discovered a body. A man had been shot to death and the posse had not fired. The theory was that the outlaws had gone into camp, had quarreled over division of the spoils and that one had died.

The body was identified as that of Fred Spess, who was known to have been a member of the gang. The detectives knew that young Jimmy Spess, an 18-year-old brother of the dead outlaw, had been with the Starr crowd, and saw their clue.

Young Spess confessed that Starr, Joe and Jim Davis and his brother had robbed the Baxter Springs bank while he held the horses.

The trail was getting hotter and hotter. Joe Davis was caught, and accused of the murder of Fred Spess. The evidence failed and he was acquitted.

CHAPTER VI.

Now "Lone Starr" became hard pressed, Oklahoma had determined to get him.

SEE U. P.'S TERMINALS

Thousands of Tacomans today accepted the Union Pacific company's invitation, and attended the formal opening of the new 15th street viaduct across the city channel, and the new terminal quarters of the road, on the east side of the channel.

With city officials present, together with 40 officials of the railroad from all parts of the country, the event took on a dignified and impressive appearance.

The reception began at 11 o'clock and was to continue until 4 this afternoon. Schmidt's orchestra played throughout the day, ensconced in one corner of the great terminal warehouses.

The terminals consist of 850,000 worth of freight sheds, 160 acres of terminal tracks, and a \$280,000 railroad and street viaduct at 15th.

Officials of the Union Pacific, from all parts of Washington and from as far east as New York, were on hand today for the opening. Train service to the new terminals will begin immediately.

Catholics Celebrate

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 15.—The most distinguished Catholic audience ever assembled in America attended the celebration of pontifical solemn high mass in St. Patrick's cathedral today, celebrating the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Catholic University of America.

Among others attending were the three American cardinals, 8 archbishops, 30 bishops and 30 monsignors.

A feature of the exercises was the reading of a letter from the pope in which he said: "We love, may we dearly cherish, the American people, forceful as they are with the vigor of youth and second to none in efficiency of action and thought."
