TWILIGHT SLEEP

(EDITOR'S NOTE—This is the second of three interviews on "painless childbirth" by Dr. Francis B. Wakefield, recognized as an American authority on the use of scopolamin for "twilight sleep" maternity.

The whole object to be accomplished by the use of scopolamin, the drug that induces the twilight sleep in which childbirth takes place without memory of pain on the part of the mother, is to produce a semi-conscious condition without interfering with the normal progress of labor.

"This may sound easy on paper, but is really a very difficult treatment to carry out successfully. It is easy enough to get the patient into the desired condition, but it is by no means so easy to perpetuate this state over an extended period, often from 12 to 15 hours.

"A sharp sound will throw the patient out of this delicate psychological equipoise. If labor is well advanced it is then almost impossible to again induce the semi-conscious state, and most certainly the patient will carry away the

memory of a certain amount of pain, thus, in her estimation, making the twilight sleep treatment unsuccessful.

She will not consider the pains she has been spared, but only carry away from the treatment recollections of those she felt at the time the drug's potency had been shattered by the noise, confusion or failure of the attending physicians to preserve the amnesia.

Ideal Conditions Necessary. "The twilight sleep treatment promises never to come into general use in public hospitals as at present conducted. The conditions required for the successful use of scopolamin in obstetrics are not to be secured in the average hospital handling a multiplicity of cases.

In the first place, the delivery room must be so situated and so equipped that the patient can be made comfortable for any number of hours at a time, and at the same time be protected from light, noise and confusion of any kind.

The attending accoucheur must remain with the patient during the entire time of labor after she is under the influence of the drug. He must watch her carefully. Her condition must be carefully managed, and fresh doses administered whenever there are signs of the drug's effects wearing off.

Few Likely to Use It. "While it is quite possible to carry out the treatment in a per-

fectly ideal way for any length of time, it requires deep special knowledge and a degree of judgment on the part of the physician amounting almost to a sixth sense for the detection of the signs through which the patient's status is revealed.

"While many men will doubtless practice the scopolamin treat-

ment, relatively few promise to make a brilliant success of it. And much of that success will depend upon the staff of expert assistants with whom they will be able to surround themselves.

Treatment More Costly. "Naturally the treatment will require more care than the old accouchement because the doctor in charge will have to devote his full time to every delivery, from beginning to end. This necessitates sacrifice of other office practice in the meantime. It is not going to be popular with the average man of the profession.

"And it is for this reason largely that twilight sleep is being 'knocked' so persistently in the medical profession.

"The results to the mothers and children of the new method of childbirth, however, amply justify all sacrifices, and the time is certainly coming when popular demand will compel all of the larger cities at least to have twilight sleep wards in their hospitals.

"Those obstetricians who have delivered women under the scopolamin treatment and who have the slightest degree of human feeling, assert that they would under no circumstance go back to the old method where a woman was allowed to undergo her ordeal with the full measure of suffering. I would certainly not go back to the old bungling methods."

BY JOHN M. OSKISON. CHAPTER VI. England, however, sadly underestimated the capacity of our handful of ships, and the skill of their commanders.

Captain Isaac Hull hinted at this when he made his dramatic escape from Broke's squadron. Then Hull engaged the Constitution against the Guerriere, sinking that crack frigate, creating a wave of wild enthusiasm all over the country, bringing a vote of thanks from congress and \$50,000 of prize money.

Constitution's victory really meant the continuation of our navy. Humphreys had all but insured Hull's story when he designed the Constitution. The American, though rated a 44, carried 55 guns to the Englishman's 49, a crew of 468 to 263; the weight of the Constitution's broadside was 736 pounds to 570 for the Guerriere.

Next, the United States met and overcame the new British frigate Macedonian. Captain Decatur's ship, the "Old Wagoner," of the American fleet, was far slower than the new Britisher, but in weight of metal, in gunnery and in crew efficiency he had a great advantage.

On the Great Lakes and on the Champlain navies were created to meet the emergency. On Erie, Perry engaged in a ship-building duel with Barclay. Perry won, and in the engagement his superiority in long guns was as 3 to 2 and in carronades 2 to 1.

Against Barclay's 6 ships and broadside of 459 pounds, Perry opposed 9 ships with a broadside of 396 pounds; he had 532 men aboard to Barclay's 420.

On Lake Ontario the American commander, Chauncey, had another building contest against Yeo, but before a decisive action peace was declared.

Most decisive of the Lakes engagements was that of September 11, 1814, when Macdonough, one of the brilliant young men of the navy, destroyed at Plattsburg the fleet that had been built to cooperate with Prevost's army of invasion. Macdonough's achievement drove back Prevost and forced England to abandon in the north any further offensive campaigns.

At New Orleans our navy helped the Carolina, attacking the invaders from the river, and the Louisiana sending a naval battery ashore to enfilade the British troops.

In the War of 1812, about 500 American ships—war vessels and privateers—captured or destroyed 1,350 British ships. While the land fights were going against the Americans, our navy was winning victories on the sea so completely that confidence in our arms was never shaken. The treaty of Ghent, December 24, 1814, left us in fine shape on the sea.

Then we had to finish the job in the Mediterranean. War was declared against Algiers on March 2, 1815, and two squadrons were fitted out to punish the corsairs. Decatur in six weeks brought the Day of Algiers to terms. Bainbridge arrived with his squadron too late to share the fighting.
