GWIN HICKS STILL FIGHTING FOR LIFE

LOS ANGELES, May 5.—The bodies of Mrs. Gwin Hicks, wife of Washington's state representative at the San Diego exposition, her two babies, Mrs. John D. Atkinson of Seattle and Mrs. Luther Brown of Pomona, lie at a local undertaker's today, with Commissioner Hicks fluctuating between life and death in the Los Angeles hospital, as the result of an automobile and interurban collision yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Hicks yesterday. Mrs. Hicks, Mrs. Atkinson and Mrs. Brown were cousins. At Linwood, on the Long Beach line, the automobile skidded upon a street car crossing, just as a fast Shasta Ann interurban sped down the tracks. The automobile was thrown 40 feet. The three women and two babies were killed almost instantaneously, and Hicks was picked up unconscious and bleeding.
