TORPEDO BRITISH FIRST-LINE SHIP

LONDON, May 28.—The fifth first-line battleship to be lost in the Dardanelles campaign was sunk yesterday.

A German torpedo struck the Majestic, a 15,000-ton craft, midships and she sank in a few minutes. Her crew was 757 men and officers, most of whom, it is said, were rescued. This is the second British battleship to be torpedoed within the week, the Triumph having gone down Wednesday.

ONE HITS TORPEDO, ONE MINE

STOCKHOLM, May 28.—The Danish steamer Ely, carrying coal, struck a mine and sank yesterday in the Aland sea.

PENZANCE, May 28.—The British steamer Caedby, en route from Oporto to Cardiff, was torpedoed and sunk by a submarine off Cornwall, it was learned today, when the survivors were landed at Newlyn by fishing vessels.

4 STATES FLOODED

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 28.—With thousands of acres of crops under water, and with two victims known dead, the floods in the states of Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Arkansas are hourly becoming more serious.

The Kansas river is rising four inches an hour; in Oklahoma \$100,000 damage has been done in Stiegler and one killed and several houses swept away in Thomsville; and in Arkansas, the levees are broken.

U. S. Cruiser Goes Ashore

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 28.—The American cruiser North Carolina has gone ashore in the outer harbor of Alexandria, Egypt, it was learned today.

A cablegram from Capt. J. W. Oman dated Thursday night reports: "Ship aground outer harbor. Unable move today. Dredge working tonight. No damage. Des Moines arrived."

Commander Is Wounded

SALONIKA, May 28.—Gen. von Sanders, German commander of the Turkish troops engaged in the Dardanelles operations, was wounded during the fighting at Gallipoli peninsula, it is reported today. He has been succeeded in the supreme command by Admiral von Usedom.

Przemysl Invested

VIENNA, May 28.—The war office reported that Przemysl was completely invested and that the whole Russian front had been driven back so effectively that it could offer no aid to the besieged fortress. It was declared that the Russian forces, mostly reservists, are completely demoralized.

On the Italian frontier the Austrian outposts continue to withdraw, and there has been no decisive action.

Use Chlorine.
 PETROGRAD, May 28.—The use of chlorine gas by the Germans was alleged by the official report of the war office. A stubborn battle was reported in the region of Przemysl. Further north the Russians claim gains of territory and the capture of many prisoners.

Germans Repulsed.
 PARIS, May 28.—The repulse of all German attacks and the success of one or two offensive movements by the French was claimed by the war office today. It was said the German losses near Arras were tremendous.

TIME TO CAN

Now is the time to can strawberries.

The recent heavy rains have caused strawberries to ripen suddenly, bringing the price down to \$1.25 a crate, wholesale, and if the rains continue a few days longer the unpicked berries will be spoiled and a sharp increase in price will result.

Owing to the rains, ranchers and pickers their berries as fast as possible, and housewives urged to buy their berries for preserving now, while the market is well stocked.

MILAN MOB RANSACKS METROPOLE

MILAN, May 28.—The first serious outbreak against the Germans occurred today with the storming and ransacking of the Metropole hotel by Italian mobs. The Metropole was under German management.

Rumors had been circulated that signals were flashed from the roof of the building to the Austrians.

A mob poured through the hotel and searched it from cellar to garret for spies.
