# SEEK TO BAR WAR FROM HEMISPHERE

PHILADELPHIA, May 29.—This pact, which is called the commercial federation, will contain a clause binding all parties to it to absolutely observe the neutrality of the high seas.

Second, that no country shall change its tariff, shipping or immigration laws without giving other nations due notice, as such laws are of international importance and affect all mankind.

Third, that when a man is himself out of the country or sends his money out of the country that becomes an international question and not a local one.

Economists who are to speak at the sessions beginning Monday claim that had such a pact as they propose been in force between the nations of Europe there would have been no war. And they assert that the success of such a pact now with South American countries, and possibly with all nations in the Western hemisphere, will prevent war forever in this side of the world.

Among those interested in the problems which will be discussed are Isaac Sprague, president of the N. W. Harris Co., Boston; Roger W. Babson, of Wellesley Hills, Mass., who has been touring South America for the Tacoma Times and its associated papers, is secretary of the society.

# URGES STRONGER NAVY

The necessity of a strong American navy, as a guarantee of peace, was urged yesterday in two talks by Rear Admiral Charles F. Pond, commander-in-chief of the Pacific reserve fleet who is here with the South Dakota.

In a comparison of the navies of the world, he placed Great Britain first, Germany second, France third, the United States fourth and either Italy or Japan fifth.

But because of the immense coast-line of the United States gave so great an opportunity for attack, he said that this nation needed even a stronger navy than it has.


