## CHARGES ADMIRER IN WASHINGTON WILDCAT FINANCE

With allegations of involved and frenzied finance almost too complicated to comprehend, A. M. Leopold of Seattle today applied for a receiver, in the King county courts, for the Home Oil Co., the Inter-Ocean Oil & Gas Co. and for B. H. Mason, Eugene Church, W. H. Young, A. M. Slauecher, R. E. Mahaffey and the Pacific Coast Finance Co., all of whom have operated in Tacoma.

He alleges that all are in a plot to defraud creditors. His allegations were that Mason, head of the Home Oil & Gas Co., which in turn had transferred it to the Pacific Coast Finance Co., of which Young, Slauecher and Mahaffey appear as responsible members.

Leopold himself claims to have \$500 claims against the Home Oil Co.; and that this company had, before the involved transferring began, 160 acres at Vale, Ore., 120 acres within 3-4 mile of the Crescent well, Tenino; 640 acres between the Washington and Jefferson wells, Hoh river; 1,250 acres in King county.

All these six instances have been within the last two months, since America sent her warning to England, Germany has asserted.
