

## Ad Men Prohis

CHICAGO, June 23.—An impromptu discussion of temperance was greeted with cheers by delegates to the eleventh annual convention of the Advertising Clubs of the World here today.

"The applause given the idea of temperance by the country's advertising men is significant of the national trend of thought," commented H. S. Houston of New York, whose name has been mentioned as next president of the Associated Clubs.

## Prince 21 Today

LONDON, June 23.—Edward, prince of Wales, is today celebrating his 21st birthday under circumstances without parallel in British royal history since the Middle Ages.

Not since the days of Edward, the Black Prince, and Henry V. (whose pre-Agincourt battles were fought while his father, Henry IV., was still alive) has an heir to the British throne fought with his father's armies, and the present Edward, if not holding supreme command, as did his illustrious predecessors, is making a special niche in history for himself by reason of his excellent work as a lieutenant in the Grenadier Guards.

## Big Copper Buy

So many vessels were in port yesterday with ore cargo for the Tacoma smelter or to load copper at its docks, that there was not room for them all at the piers.

The Norwegian steamer Tricolor brought 5,600 tons of ore from South America, the Northwestern 1,500 tons from Alaska, and the Eureka, 2,000 tons from South America.

The steamers Santa Clara and Montanan will load 1,200 and 2,000 tons of copper, respectively, for New York.

## Druggists Meet

SEATTLE, June 23.—The first day's session yesterday of the Washington State Pharmaceutical association, held in the Commercial club, was given over to the annual address of the president, George H. Bartell. Today the officers for the ensuing year will be elected, and the place of the next meeting chosen.

Bartell said legitimate druggists should take a unified stand to see that the prohibition law is enforced after Jan. 1, so that druggists would not be brought into disrepute by those seeking to evade the law.

## Hands His Jonah

The suspect, when arrested, admitted he was William Morgan, the man sought.

## Named By Japs?

An eminent Japanese scholar, Prof. Cho-Yo of the University of Tokio, says that the name Tacoma was given the mountain by the Japanese in pre-historic days, long before the Indians named it.

The name, he said, meant the "Highest Light of Day." With some other scholars, he thinks the Indians on the Pacific coast were descendants of the Japanese.

## Set Dahlia Dates

Dates for Tacoma's Dahlia show this year definitely set for August 20 and 21.

The show will be in the roof-garden of Rhodes' store. There will be no entrance fee, no restriction as to the kind or amount of flowers to be entered and no admission fee.

A grand prize will be given the winner of the most points, and 17 gold medals for sweet-pea and dahlia exhibits.

## U. S. Stops Japs?

THE HAGUE, June 23.—It is understood here today that Japan was only prevented from sending to the European battlefields an army of 300,000 men that had been mobilized in Manchuria by the hint from Washington that the expedition would not be looked upon as desirable.

## Poet Is 'Lawed'

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 23.—A civil action for the collection of a commission alleged to be due to a local lecture bureau caused the nominal detention for a short time yesterday of Alfred Noyes, poet laureate of England, who is attending the Harvard commencement exercises. Today he is under bonds of \$200 to appear in court.


