Check Italians Along Isonzo

LONDON, June 23.—An admission that the Austrians have completely checked the Italian invasion along the Isonzo river is made by the Italian war office. High on the cliffs and palisades, they have blasted entrenchments and artillery positions in the solid rock, and have laughed at every attempt by the Italians to dislodge them.

The latter have suffered severely in scaling the heights.

On the west front, the French and Germans are locked in a terrific struggle near Arras. As yet there is no decisive result.

Along the eastern front, the Austro-Germans continue their normal advance. The Slavs are everywhere in retreat.

Charges against the men, on 48 different counts, altogether charge a conspiracy to tamper with returns at the last election. A situation similar to that at Terre Haute is expected.

MAYOR KICKS ON HAVING CITY COPS AT RACES

Mayor Fawcett made a strenuous kick today when Commissioner Mills announced that he would permit policemen to work in uniform at the Tacoma Speedway during the races July 4 and 5.

"I'm directly in violation of a city ordinance," objected Fawcett. "Anyway, your officers have no jurisdiction outside the city limits. There are plenty of men in Tacoma without work who could be hired to be policemen for a couple of days, and who would appreciate the job. I don't see why we should allow our men to work for a private institution like the Speedway."

Mills explained that his officers would work during their off-duty period, and would be paid by the Speedway.

MORE WORK THAN SINCE WAR BEGAN

E. W. Olson, state labor commissioner, says there is less unemployment now than at any other time since the war began. The wheat harvesting and fruit-picking are demanding much labor, he says. He adds that Oregon labor agencies are taking advantage of the Washington law to ship in many men.

DECLARES MUNICIPAL HEALTH OFFICES WEAK

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—Full time health officers, and more adequate local departments of health were urged upon Ameri-

can cities last evening by Dr. J. W. Kerr of Washington, D. C., before the 66th annual convention of the American Medical association.

Dr. Kerr declared that municipal health bureaus were the weakest links in the chain of national defenses against disease.
