ITALY TO OPEN WAR ON TURKS

ROME, June 29.—Today or tomorrow surely will see a formal declaration of war by Italy on Turkey. This action will be followed by the dispatch of an Italian fleet to aid the allies in the Dardanelles.

Other diplomatic developments are that Germany is endeavoring to persuade Austria to placate Serbia, and to promise Roumania enough territory to keep her from joining in the struggle on the part of the allies.

WAR HITS HOLLAND WORKERS

THE HAGUE, June 29.—With from 40 to 75 per cent of the members of various trade crafts unemployed, the workmen of Holland are suffering most seriously from the effects of the war.

In the large building trades unions, from 40 to 50 per cent of the members are out of work, and the strike and unemployment funds long since have been exhausted. In the diamond cutters' union, 75 per cent are idle.


POSTOFFICE GETS SAME AS IN 1914-15

SWEARS IN 25 EXTRA OFFICERS

TACOMA A BACKWOODS TOWN IN ONE RESPECT, SAYS EXPERT

"Tacoma's health department makes me think of a police department in a large city, conducted by a chief and one policeman. You have four men for your department, and one of them works on half time."

Dr. Charles E. North, milk and health expert from New York city, who gave an address on milk standardization at the Commercial club yesterday noon, handed Tacoma a none too gentle rap, in an interview following his lecture.

Backwoods In a Way.

The eastern expert declared that Tacoma was a backwoods town, so far as its health department efficiency was concerned, and criticized Mayor Fawcett for having cut down the staff. He declared that while money had been saved the efficiency of the department had been materially decreased.

"Tacoma is far behind the other cities of the country in its health protection," declared Dr. North. "I didn't make these statements in my lecture, because I didn't want to jar these men and women here too strongly, but nevertheless it is true."

"Your city is paying the lowest tax rate, proportionately, of any city in the country for health protection."

Lucky, That's All.

"But, doctor," he was asked, "don't you think that Tacoma is doing well with her 9-cent tax? What's the use of spending more money when we couldn't improve conditions?"

"That's just it," replied the expert. "You are not doing well. Temporarily, you are free from epidemics. You are lucky, that's all. Suppose that an epidemic should break out. What would your health department do? Nothing! It is not organized. It wouldn't know where to begin. It wouldn't have the number of employees or the equipment for beginning if it did know how."

"What you want in a health department is an organization to fight disease, and prevent it. You want an organization that will clean up your city and make an epidemic impossible."

Praises Milk Campaign.

Dr. North found time to hand Tacoma one compliment, however.

"I want to say this for Tacoma," he said. "You should be complimented for what you have done in the milk purification campaign, considering the small amount of money spent for the health department."

"You have given every cow supplying milk to Tacoma the tuberculin test. That is something that probably no other city in the country has done. Your work in that line has been remarkable."

Hungary has forbidden the exportation of wheat into Austria. Budapest is enjoying the luxury of white bread while Vienna's war bread is constantly growing darker in shade and more unpalatable.
