
BASEBALL BOXING

TOM COWLER, NEWEST IN HEAVYWEIGHTS BEING TOUTED FOR TITLE BY JIM CORBETT



BY BROWN HOLMES. Tow Cowler, born in Cumberland, England, is the newest thing in the way of heavyweights. He was discovered by Jim Corbett, and Jim says he is a wonder. Everybody else will have to be shown in view of the many heavyweight flippers of the past few years.

"This fellow has something these other alleged heavyweights didn't have," says Jim. "He's got a good left. He's got the best left jab I ever saw or felt, and I have seen and felt, also dodged, a few. He just jabs away with that left and it looks like a piston rod everlastingly shooting out! When he gets his man worn away, he shoots over a right haymaker. That left will win the title for him."

When Corbett was filling a theatrical engagement in Portland, Ore., several months ago, Cowler came to him to ask advice. He said he was just a dumb boxer. Corbett liked his looks, put on the gloves with him, got soaked on the jaw and took the big fellow with him to Australia.

Corbett and his new fighter got the laugh there, but Jim insisted on a try-out for the big boy. Cowler met Lee O'Donnell, speed merchant of the Antipodes, and O'Donnell lasted eight rounds. The police stopped the fight. Then Cowler met Jim Coghill and knocked him cold in three rounds. His next opponent was Ned Doyle, who had never been knocked off his feet. Doyle lasted two rounds.

INTEREST GROWS IN U. S. AMATEUR TEAMS

With the date growing near for the American championship series between amateur ball clubs, at the San Francisco exposition, intense interest in amateurs is developing all over the country.
