BASEBALL NEEDS NEW DISCOVERY MAYBE GENE DALE HAS FOUND IT

One thing needed to put new interest in baseball is a new discovery, something like the spitball which gave fans new heroes to worship and something new to talk about.

The pitchers who stand out this season, with few exceptions, have stood out before, fellows like Grover Alexander and Smokey Joe Wood. They, like others who have done well, are using speed or the spitball.

The one hurler with something new, a fooler that may get into the same class with the spitball and put a new "kick" in the game, is Gene Dale of the Cincinnati Reds. He broke in this season with a slow curve, the likes of which had never been seen on a big league diamond.

I saw Dale in his first game against the New York Giants. McGraw's men had never seen anything like the youngster's slow one and they did not get a hit in

seven innings. Hans Lobert, who has looked at all kinds of foolers, was so badly fooled, he fell backward to the ground twice.

I saw Dale strike out Stengel and Wheat of Brooklyn in succession, with runners on bases. Stengel and Wheat take big swings.

They cut at Dale's slow one before the ball reached the plate.

Dale's curve is different from others' curves in that it does not break sharply. It's a "round-house" curve. It travels in a big swoop.

Dale has won one-third of the Red's victories. Dale's one-eighth of curves; dotted their defeats. Line the average. And as for creating new in-

terest, Dale has done that. He is the one pitcher Cincinnati fans look to for entertainment. They'll go to see him pitch when they won't go to see the others.

Since Dale has shown his new fooler, other pitchers are trying to copy it. Maybe he has started something that will spread as the spitball did, give fans new idols to worship and something to howl about. That's what baseball needs.

PUBLIC TENNIS COURTS MAKE IT GREATEST AMATEUR GAME

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—Tennis is going to give baseball a close run for popularity in America.

Sure, a tennis fan makes this prediction; Clarence Griffin of California, who has been several kinds of a racquet champ during the past three years.

Neither the game nor its enthusiasts here are of the "sissy" brand, and a San Francisco sports census shows as many tennis adherents as baseball boasts.

"The maintenance of municipal tennis courts is responsible," explains Griffin. "San Francisco demonstrated that public courts would be eagerly patronized and that they satisfied a deep craving of the average man and woman for play. Other cities are now following suit."

"Tennis is today the people's greatest and cleanest amateur sport. Griffin at 27 is a master exponent of the game he espouses. Pacific coast doubles champion for two, and winner in 1914 of the Clay Court tournament at Cincinnati, he recently annexed further honors by defeating Norris Williams, national singles champion, in a crucial semi-final game here.
