Printing Shows a Big Year

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 7.—When President Marsden G. Scott of the International Typographical union opens the sixty-first session of that organization Aug. 9, it will be a history-making event for this city, as it will be the first time an international labor union has held its convention in the City of the Angels.

This city was long known as the bulwark of the open shop and the manufacturers' associations did not encourage or give aid to labor conventions or labor unions. It was a hard task to dissipate anti-union feeling, but persistent effort won a square deal for the unionists, and now Los Angeles has a prominent place on the map of associated labor.

Last year the I. T. U. marketed \$61,155,285 in skilled labor to employers in the printing industry, an increase over the preceding year of \$104,953.

The average earnings per member per year were \$1,026.51, the paid-up membership for 1915 59,571, an increase of 1034 over the previous year; more than 100 unions secured scale end increases in the year ended May 31.
