WILL CUT MOUNTAIN FARE ABOUT IN HALF

If the plans of Charles Atherton, president of the Blue-Bird Tours Co., materialize, Mt. Tacoma soon will become a mountain for the every day folks of this city as well as for the wealthy tourists of the east.

He has plans all ready to announce, except for a few details, which will make it possible for the ordinary Tacoman to go clear up to the edge of the snow at Reese's camp and back for about half the present rate.
 The exact fare will be announced in The Times later this week.
 "This idea of having our own workmen and girls unable to take a trip to the mountain which lies at their very backdoor never has appealed to me," said Atherton today. "It seemed unjust that a rate which to a workingman or working girl is too high, should stand in their way. Every Tacoman ought to see the mountain; ought to become a loyal booster for it."
 Atherton's newly planned trip would provide for auto to the Nisqually glacier, and a short hike from there over a good trail to Reese's.

 Miss Young, who is the daughter of Edward M. Kimball and Pauline Maddern, both actors, was born in Chicago and spent part of her early life in Goldfield, Nevada, when that Nat Goodwinized town enjoyed a brief gold boom.
 There, at the age of five, she made her debut in "Peck's Bad Boy," and so tickled was the rough audience of miners with her pretty face and her big brown eyes, that they insisted upon a song.
 Little Clara, nothing loath, responded, and for the rest of the evening she was the star of the show.
 When she finished school she was living in Seattle. The manager of Gabriel Frawley's stock company took one look at Clara's eyes and said, "You are engaged." Then she came on to New York in 1911 looking for a position.
 Some one, struck by her beauty, told her she should go into the movies, even though at first she might make less money. She took the advice and dropped a \$100 job for \$25 a week in the films.
 It was not long before people began to rave about her good looks. AND EVERY RAVE ADDED DOLLARS TO HER PAY CHECK.
 She's about medium height and girlishly slender. Her wavy hair is deep dark brown and her eyes, unusually large and most symmetrical, are a limpid brown.
 Even a star cannot carry a show all by herself. He must have support. Clara's eyes have ample support. Her features are clear cut, cameo-like, well-modeled. Her mouth is pretty and well-formed, and when she smiles rows of even white teeth are revealed.

NEW HUMAN BIRD COMES TO EXPO

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 9.—Signor (not Senor) Silvio Pettrossi, who is in San Francisco to astound the gaping exposition crowds with aeroplane stunts, can't speak English. He doesn't need to. Signor Pettrossi—pretty, oh, very pretty and ever so young—speaks English for her darling husband.
 Signor Pettrossi comes from Asuncion, Paraguay. He was educated in the wonderful technical schools of Italy. Before the outbreak of the European war he finished a course in aeroplaning in the school of Deperstussin, the famous builder of the monoplane of that name, near Paris.
 Signor Pettrossi was born in Uruguay, and educated in France. They have been married six months.
 Pettrossi's monoplane, one of the lightest machines of its type on his hemisphere, is being set up by this devoted Italian mechanic—who refuses to sleep in a hotel since that takes him too far from his beloved charge. Exposition authorities had to provide a bed for him beside the monoplane.
 Some of Aviator Pettrossi's daring stunts are: "dead-leaf drift," "top drop," consisting of a spinning decent upon a vertical line that puts the spiral dip out of business; the "vertical turn," the "wing loop-the-loop," made from side to side which puts the head-on variety of loop-the-loop on the shelf as a thriller.
