





INDIANS WILL SHAKE AND MISSIONARIES CAN'T STOP PRACTICE

NEAH BAY, Aug. 14.—Dr. Weeds, the agent, sent for a young Makah Indian named Charley, and when Charley came, the doctor asked: “Charley, you shake, don't you?”
“Yes, sir.”
“Why?”
“Well, sir, it's hard to explain. It sort of seems I have to. It seems that God is commanding me to. So I shake.”
“You shake when the others shake, don't you, Charley?” questioned the doctor.
“No, sir. Sometimes, when the others are shaking, I sit still. At other times I shake all alone. And sometimes we all shake together.”
The doctor was trying to prove to me that the “Shakers”—nearly all the fish-eating Indians are “Shakers,” to the horror and grief of Miss Clark, the Presbyterian missionary—are influenced by hypnotism.
But Charley stuck to it that he shook or sat still, as the spirit moved, and that what the others might be doing did not influence him in the least.
The doctor was puzzled. He called it “self-hypnotism,” and let it go at that.

It was four years ago that the “Shaker” movement came to the Olympic peninsula. It came from some knows where. It is not related to the Shaker religion back in Pennsylvania and Ohio. It has no founder, no high priest. Wherever two or more families of fish-eating Indians dwell—in the mountains where they still live by hunting and trapping in the clearings in the foothills, where they raise stunted, half-wild ponies; on the Pacific coast, on the reservations at Osetta, Hoh, Quileute, Neah Bay and

Quenilt—there they “shake” with fanatic zeal.
Outwardly stoical, the Indian is high-strung and emotional inside. Under governmental displeasure, as represented by the agent, they have had to abandon their ancient “heathen” rites. They have been told it is “ignorant superstition” to believe in “totems” and other spirits, good and bad.
Years ago Catholic priests went through the mountains, making many converts among the Indians. Later the Protestant missionaries came, but they make little headway against the “Shaker” faith.
Old-timers in the country see in the “Shaker” meetings an incongruous blending of the ancient Indian rites and the ceremonials of the Catholic church. The cross is used.
There are priests and priestesses. At Neah Bay, the largest reservation, Miss Clark, the Presbyterian missionary, holds services every Sunday morning from 11 to 12. The priests and priestesses are always in the congregation, and they give the little missionary flattering attention.
The “Shakers” meet from noon to 2. Straight from the mission church go the priests and priestesses to the “Shaker” meeting to repeat Miss Clark's sermon with trills.
Then they shake. They laugh and their eyes roll. They utter quaver cries, sometimes plaintive, sometimes glad. Often they sink to the floor—the meetings are held in the Indians' homes—and lie in a state of coma.
Bill Hayte once went into a trance and stayed in it for hours. Miss Clarke grieves. Dr. Woods makes no secret of his displeasure.
But he can't forbid “shaking.” The “Shakers” are Christians. The fact is, probably, that “shaking” provides “good medicine,” more zealous and more nearly like the spirit-worship of their fathers than can be found in the gentle orthodoxy of Miss Clark's excellent sermons.
