M'MULLIN, OF TACOMA, GOES TO WHITE SOX

Fred McMullin, one of the best infielders who ever moved upward from the Tacoma Northwestern league club, was yesterday sold by Los Angeles to the Chicago White Sox, at a price far in excess, it is reported, of that which the Tacoma team received for him.

McMullin is making good in such a sensational manner his Tacoma friends are ready to believe that he will soon become one of the stars of the big leagues. "Mac" came to Tacoma in the latter part of the 1912 season. He played third, remaining for the next two seasons. He was a wonder on third, and was looked upon as one of the greatest players in the league.

Last year he was sold on option to Detroit. Amongst the big fellows, McMullin was a little nervous, and did not quite come up to the Detroit expectations. But before he could be sent back to Tacoma, Los Angeles snapped him up, paying Tacoma the option price for him. In the Coast league he has been going like a house afire, and Comiskey of the White Sox has been watching him eagerly all season.

Zeb Terry, shortstop of Los Angeles, also goes to Chicago by the

new deal. This means that Johnny Butler, former Tiger, who has played "fly" infielder for the Angels, will undoubtedly get the short position for a steady place. Butler has been batting .302 in the Coast league.

Anglers Excel 'Frisco Scores

Although no world's records are expected to be broken in the bait and fly casting tournament being staged in Tacoma under auspices of the Tacoma Bait and Fly Casting club, some remarkable scores for accuracy and distance are being recorded. At the opening session of the tournament yesterday at the Point Defiance sunken lagoon, scores for accuracy casting were even better than those made in the recent tournament of national anglers, at the San Francisco exposition.

High scores of yesterday's events were made by A. C. Burghardt of Portland, who cast a one-fourth ounce bait 110 feet 8 3/4 inches; F. N. Peet, of Chicago, and W. J. Bailey of Tacoma, who tied in the accuracy bait casting event, with scores of 98.1 per cent; J. C. Myers of Portland, who cast a fly 105 feet; F. N. Peet casting a fly for 99.3 per cent accuracy.

Final events are being staged this afternoon, to be followed by a sportsmen's outdoor dinner on the beach at sundown.

Eddie Plank, at 41, Has Best Record In League

BY BROWN HOLMES Eddie Plank, although in his 41st summer, is having one of the best seasons of his career. His record, made with the St. Louis Feds after he was released outright by Connie Mack, is one that any hurler half his age might well be proud of.

Plank has pitched 149 innings and allowed 34 runs, an average of 2.07 runs per game. That includes runs scored on errors, tallies over which the veteran flinger had no control. His average based on earned runs is less than two a game.

Plank's average is the best in the Federal league, despite the tight pitching, at times, of Gene Packard and Nick Cullop of Kansas City; George McConnell,

Claude Hendrix and Miner Brown of Chicago.

Plank has worked three shut-outs and pitched four three-hit games. One of these, against Chicago secured only one safety off the old fellow's delivery.

Plank has pitched three nine-inning games in which he did not pass a batter. In his 149 innings he has held opponents to 98 hits, an average of a fraction more than five a game.

Plank's record is better than some he made with the pennant winning Athletics. That, of course, does not mean he is a better pitcher, because the Fed league does not contain the same class. The record does show, though, that Plank is still quite a hurler and at 41 is doing better than hurlers who have the advantage of youth and strength.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—John McGraw of the New York Giants handed Rube Marquard his goodbye notice yesterday, announcing that he had sold the big left-hander to the Toronto club of the International league.

All other major league clubs passed up Marquard because of his high price, and it is believed that after he goes to Toronto his salary, under the existing contract, will be paid by both clubs.

Marquard was old to New York in 1908 for \$11,000 by the Indianapolis club. In 1912 he developed into a phenom, and in 1912 he made his record of 19 straight victories.

BATTERY MEN OF OLD LEAGUE HALF THIEVES.

Nearly 200 more bases have been swiped this season in the American league than in the National. A total of 982 sacks have been pilfered in the younger league, 794 in the National.

The speed of the men in the two league is about the same, so the difference lies in the ability of catchers to stop the runners and of pitchers to hold runners up at first base.

Three American clubs—Detroit, Chicago and New York—have stolen more than 150 sacks each, while the best mark in the National is 122 by Pittsburgh.


