## Commissioners Still Think Budget Is None of People's Business

The county commissioners today would give no definite figures concerning the budget which has been discussed behind closed doors and which is expected to be finished within a day or so. But they did say there would be a cut in all offices but their own and the sheriff's, auditor's and prosecuting attorney's.

These departments must have extra money when the state goes dry, for added expense of hunting blind pigs and prosecuting them. The auditor's office will handle the liquor permits, receiving 25 cents apiece, while the office expense will amount to more than the fee.

Assessor J. J. Cameron today still insisted he would stand firm against paying \$1,800 for a machine for his department, claiming he can run a Ford 6,000 miles at five cents a mile.

One of the largest reductions will be made in the road districts, according to the commissioners. Six thousand dollars will be saved in Slayden's district No. 5, the rate being reduced from six to five mills, while his district No. 1 will see a cut of \$12,000, meaning a reduction of from five to three mills for the taxpayers.

Reed and Slayden will cut their road estimates, but Williams will have his present rate.

Commissioner Slayden hopes to reduce the county road and bridge fund from \$150,000 to \$100,000.

**Cut Fire Department.**

Because completion of the department budgets could not be completed in time for action this morning, the council postponed its preliminary work on the 1916 municipal estimates until afternoon.

Fire Chief McAlevy appeared in Mayor Fawcett's office today to protest cut in the fire department.

"Now, Mac, you might as well be a good fellow and let us make these cuts," declared the mayor. The people will appreciate you more if you just accept the inevitable."

"But Mayor," protested McAlevy, "we're having a hard time as it is to cover a city of 46 square miles area. Cut down the city limits, and I don't care how much you cut the fire department."

But the mayor warned the chief that the St. Helens av. fire station, and maybe others, would have to be abolished.

## FRIENDS OF PEACE CHEER EVERYBODY

CHICAGO, Sept. 7. — The Friends of Peace continued their spectacular sessions yesterday when they cheered madly at Congressman Henry Vollmer, who denounced the administration for allowing the shipment of munitions to the allies, and then applauded William Jennings Bryan when he complimented the president.

Vollmer said that the United States really was unneutral when it offered both sides supplies which it knew only one could get.

"President Wilson loves peace, and is trying with every means at his disposal to preserve our country's peace," said Bryan.

## 15 ARE ILL OF TYPHOID HERE

There are 15 cases of typhoid fever in Tacoma today, the greatest number of cases at one time it has had in more than a year.

Five of the cases are in one block, at North 15th and Oakes sts.

Mayor Fawcett denied that city water had anything to do with the prevalence of the disease.

## HEALTH OFFICE NEARLY PAYS

Declaring that he had cut the operating expense of his department 32 per cent since he took office last year, Mayor Fawcett today issued a set of figures to show that he had brought the health office up to almost a self-sustaining basis.

In March, for example, the receipts of the mayor's department were \$2,248.48, and the expenditures were \$2,248.48, showing a net profit of \$79.89.

In the first six months of 1915 the health department cost the taxpayers, above receipts, only \$9,229.59 for operating expenses.
