

TYPHOID CAME FROM A SPRING

Part of Tacoma's present typhoid epidemic was caused by disease germs in a natural spring at Point Defiance park, according to the announcement today by Health Officer H. A. Wall.

Five cases, all residents of the neighborhood of North 15th and Oakes streets, have been traced directly to the water. These five persons, who include Burns Poe, progressive party official, drank the water.

SLUISKIN PROBLEM FOR U. S. OFFICIALS

Upon the decision of officials at Washington, D. C., rests today whether old Chief Sluiskin, 82 years old, the Indian who first guided white men to the foot of Mt. Tacoma, shall be allowed to hunt and fish for a living in the National park.

The rules of the park are that he cannot. But Chief Sluiskin has treaties, which precede all other law, he says, which give him and his tribe that right.

He wants to know if these treaties are mere scraps of paper. Government officials are studying the law of the case. With Chief Sluiskin are 80 or 85 tribesmen.

Sluiskin is white-haired, and of a venerable appearance. In his parley with U. S. employes, who warned him out of the park, and in the discussion of the treaty which followed, the Indians referred to the mountain continuously as Tacoma.
